May God's gift be your blessing this Christmas and new year!!



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

Pastor Greg's Installation 7th February 2016

It was always my hope that as chairperson I would never have to deal with calling a new pastor. As Greg has told us on a number of occasions, there is a difference between hope and wishful thinking.

Greg and Connie's departure has crept up on us quickly as we have been focussing for some time on the fete. I need not say too much about the fete as that is dealt with elsewhere, but briefly - we were blessed with excellent weather, a good crowd, some very positive feedback and a budget target satisfied. As our fifth successive annual fete, we are gaining some efficiencies and feeling a bit more confident in delivery. A big thanks to Joel, taking over the role of Fete Director this year, and doing it well.

As Greg received more and more calls over time, I started keeping a record of when he was called and when he declined (or so I hoped - now the record includes one acceptance). 14 calls later, we have enough data to report some statistics. What we have learnt from this is that a typical pastor (Greg) takes an average of 33 days to decline a call, and at least 19 days but never more than 54. However it takes 82 days to accept a call. This perhaps reflects the difficulty of making a decision to uproot oneself and one's family to follow a calling - Gideon demanded evidence through the golden fleece, Moses quoted every excuse in the book, Samuel had to be asked 3 times, and Greg and Connie took 82 days. By the time this edition is published, we would have already said our farewells to Greg and Connie at the "Greg Fowler, This is Your Life (at Golden Grove)" event and Greg would have preached his last message and performed his last baptismal act at Golden Grove on November 26. We do wish them every blessing for their new ministry at Faith Lutheran College, Redlands, and thank them for their service to our congregation over a period of eight years.

(*Reflections on Greg's ministry are elsewhere in this edition.*) In other news from Church Council, briefly:

- An updated Joint Usage Agreement between the church and school has been signed off by both parties. There are no major changes in arrangements, but the document has been updated in line with current practices. Also some of the history behind the agreement has been captured so it does not get forgotten as it is passed on and updated by future generations of church and school councils.
- We have entered into a contract to build a new manse please refer to the "House wants a Pastor" article.
- Investing the proceeds of the manse sale into term deposits was surprisingly difficult, mostly due to stricter identification requirements related to anti-money-laundering rules. That has been worked through and hopefully will not be a problem again in the future. Following the Special General Meeting in June in which the congregation gave authority to invest the money in term deposits and other securities, the available funds were split roughly 40%/60% in term deposits and registered first mortgage loans. Details will be provided at the Half-Yearly Meeting.
- Insurance has been causing some disquiet of late. With the backdrop that the school is having some challenges with its claim relating to the collapse of the retaining walls ("a few small glitches", as Will understates in his article following), insurance for the fete is becoming complicated and may affect the future of some activities that have traditionally been a part of the day; it is quite difficult to nail down our cover in any detail because of the way group insurance works; and on top of that the invoicing timing is being brought forward which means we have two invoices to pay in 2023. Needless to say, this is a regular topic at Church Council meetings, but to what extent the situation can be improved is still hard to predict.

• Budget-wise, our projection for the end of year puts us at a deficit but a slightly smaller deficit than we had planned. Given the two insurance payments as explained above, and that we made a contribution to the District that was not in the budget, overall it is a reasonable outcome. Our predictions for next year and beyond are improving, particularly once the manse is completed in 2025. However, the predictions do rely on a small increase in offerings each year, so I would ask that you take the opportunity as we head into the new year to review your giving and at least consider an increase in line with CPI if you have the capacity to do so.

Now we turn our focus to calling a new pastor. Coincident with the Half-Yearly Meeting, we will have a precall meeting to analyse our needs and decide on a call committee. This should lead to placing a call early next year. A pastor has a month to respond (33 days in Greg's case), and if they accept, three months to move. Therefore our vacancy period is at best until around June 2024, and as we know from our own past experience as well as the current experience of other congregations, it is likely to be much longer. We are blessed to have 6 young people stepping up to lead our services; Steen Olsen will provide some regular pastoral input for the worship leaders, oversight of confirmation and pastoral visits, and lead a communion service once per month; we expect to have other visiting pastors as well. I would ask everyone to support our young leaders, and consider stepping up to a lay ministry role of any sort to help share the load during our vacancy period.



With the end of the year being so busy for the cafe and volunteers, it was decided this year to celebrate our year and festive period by getting together in July.

We have also enjoyed sleepovers, excursions to Adelaide Zoo, commemorating Remembrance Day, the Festival of Music and Year 6 Exhibition. The originality, quality and insight of our student learning really is quite amazing and a testament to our students and our teaching team.



Pastor Greg Reflections from GGLC Chairman

Greg and I started our respective roles here at the same time. I wasn't involved in the calling process so I had little prior knowledge of Greg. I've known a pastor or two over the years, and so had a mental image - right or wrong - of what to expect.

In my mind a pastor was a bald guy, at least ten but probably twenty years older than me, unable to use a computer system and prone to forgetting appointments.

So when Greg turned up with his curly locks, being not very different in age from myself, there were adjustments to be made. I soon learned that Greg is also quite comfortable with computers and is very good at keeping appointments.

Not only did we have a new pastor and chairperson at the beginning of 2016, we also had a new school principal in Shane. I think one of the significant influencing factors in Greg coming to Golden Grove was the opportunity to be involved in school ministry - and indeed no doubt one of his key reasons for moving to Faith Lutheran College Redlands as well. As events transpired, in late 2015 our principal Daryl also decided it was time for a change in scenery, so Greg may have felt a little bit like he'd been involved in a bait and switch scam when he turned up and Daryl had moved on.

So looking back on that time, when Greg arrived I think he slipped quite smoothly into the joys of the day to day work here, but defining the church-school relationship and the pastor's role in the school was an ongoing struggle for a number of years. This is something that Greg and Shane, as well as the respective church and school councils, worked hard on resolving - if you look at our Partnership Covenant, our new Mission Statement, - where we talk about intentionally developing the mutual relationship - and also the school Constitution and Joint Usage Agreement - you will see the fruits of that work.

There was a lot happening in those first years, which set the foundation for the ministry in the later years. Early on, rebuilding our children's ministry was a priority, we upgraded our altar and sanctuary furniture, we ventured into renovations to address some of the friction points in people coming to church and to launch a cafe ministry, as well as celebrating our 30th anniversary and hosting a one day District Synod, and launching Teaching Saturdays. Later on came the fete. Those are all things that came as team decisions from Church Council but Greg backed them all, otherwise they probably would not have happened.

And then COVID. The world as we knew it ceased to be. Church worship services were very much in the line of fire of the health restrictions. What struck me most is how Greg walked onto the stage on our first exclusively live-streamed service, and made it look like he had been doing it for years. That very first live-stream only service, when we look back on it, captured a lot about our congregation and Greg's time - it reflects Greg's unshakeability, our technology and resourcefulness, the skills of our volunteers who made this happen, and our community who rallied in this situation.



In this new series, the sequel to the highly acclaimed "Pastor Wants a House" reality series of one episode that was prematurely axed when the main character departed, we examine new developments in the quest to build a new manse to house a new pastor.

FIRST YORKSHIREMAN:


Oh, we used to dream of livin' in a corridor! Would ha' been a palace to us. We used to live in an old water tank on a rubbish tip. We got woke up every morning by having a load of rotting fish dumped all over us! House? Huh. FOURTH YORKSHIREMAN: Well, when I say 'house' it was only a hole in the ground covered by a sheet of tarpaulin, but it was a house to us. SECOND YORKSHIREMAN: We were evicted from our 'ole in the ground; we 'ad to go and live in a lake. THIRD YORKSHIREMAN: You were lucky to have a lake! There were a hundred and fifty of us living in t' shoebox in t' middle o' road. FIRST YORKSHIREMAN: Cardboard box? ... from Monty Python's Flying Circus - "Four Yorkshiremen"

Recapping, we decided to sell the manse at 8 Laredo Ct primarily because of issues associated with the spiral staircase, and in the hope that we might improve our financial position in the changeover. Then the housing market suddenly hit boiling point, we couldn't have bought a shoebox in t' middle o' road (nor any of the other options suggested in the sidebar), and Greg and Connie were on the verge of being kicked out on the verge. That is where we pick up the story...

From early on in the process, there was a plan B: to build. There are obvious reasons why it was not plan A the time frame of ~ 2 years, proximity of available land, builder and cost risks, finding alternative accommodation in the meantime - but ultimately we decided that building would lead to the best outcome, delivering better and higher value accommodation without putting us in a worse financial position.



"We have selected the option to have the footings cast in gold rather than concrete." Opportunities for vacant land in our area are mixed. The typical block is around 300m2 with a frontage of 9-11m at \$1000/m2 or more. The narrow frontage is problematic for a double garage and largely forces a two-storey build. Any wider frontage blocks are more expensive, as would be demolition of an existing house. There are new developments being opened up in Golden Grove (one near Garden Grove, another along One Tree Hill Rd) but they are on a 2-5 year horizon for availability. It is starting to become common for larger blocks in Gulfview Heights and Salisbury Heights to be redeveloped into several smaller blocks, but they are typically Community Title with common property. The far side of Salisbury Heights is still being developed, but we were fortunate with our timing that a very large block in the heart of Salisbury Heights had recently been subdivided into Torrens Title blocks along a new road called Gully View Ct, and these were within our target range of 10 minutes travel to church.





All of the blocks on Gully View Ct presented building challenges because of the slopes, but after evaluating four of those blocks and some others nearby, we chose the one at the end of the cul-de-sac, adjacent to the eponymous gully where the best gully views are to be found. At 854m2, it is relatively large for a modern block (albeit with an SA Water encumbrance, which was present on all of the available blocks) and we hope will have good resale value should we ever have to go through this exercise again.


Settlement for the land was in July, but even well before that, Paul Napier - member of our congregation and Housing Consultant with Fairmont Homes - had been supporting us in developing plans, determining costs, working through engineering and ultimately leading us to sign a contract with Fairmont Homes as of November 13. The build will be a 4 bedroom, double garage house, with 2 main living areas, an extra rumpus/study space, alfresco area and ensuite/walk-in-robe to the main bedroom. The alfresco and living areas overlook the gully and the view to the setting sun. We have selected the option to have the footings cast in gold rather than concrete. (I should qualify - the footings are actual concrete but the price is as if gold, due to the highly reactive clay soils on the site demanding a particularly hefty footing). This has impacted the anticipated build price by about 10%, which does make the budget less attractive, but nevertheless should still lead us to a position at completion where our loans are substantially less than they were when we started this process.


Since we have now signed a building contract, we have until early April to prepare the site (e.g. retaining walls, stormwater connection, weed control). To minimise costs we will do whatever we can ourselves, so please look forward to some working bees!

We can expect completion around the first quarter of 2025, a shiny new house ready for a shiny new pastor. We do of course hope that we will have a new pastor before then, and interim accommodation will be provided as we have done for Greg and Connie.

WALLAROO NORTH BEACH HOLIDAY PARK Friday to Sunday 30 Jun-3 Jul

35 adventurers travelled to Wallaroo with accommodation at the Wallaroo Holiday Park. The jetty was most popular for fishing with several keepers landed. Notable were Keith Hasler's 33cm King George whiting and Alison Goodchild's 2 large squid. Zimmo almost landed a very large flathead which released itself prior to landing. Point Riley was visited however yielded no fish. A family BBQ was held at the camp kitchen on Saturday night – thanks to Christine McCulloch for arranging and coordinating food.

RAMCO POINT (River Murray) - Saturday 12 Aug 10am to 4pm

The weather was great and the Carp were biting for the 43 fishers (including 7 Juniors) who made the river trip. GGAF provided a sausage sizzle lunch thanks to the Golden Grove Lutheran Primary School for use of their BBQ trailer. A total of 134 Carp were weighed in. Total weight was 64 Kg. Senior winner was Jenna Scott—a 77 cm Carp weighing 6.62 kg – being the second largest freshwater fish caught in the Club's history. Jenna caught 4 Carp with a total weight of 12.3kg. Junior winner was Harley Benes with a 48 cm Carp weighing 1.19 kg – this was Harley's first day with GGAF. Lou Goegan caught the most Carp on the day with 19, closely followed by Graeme Hoklas with 18.


