When COVID-19 first appeared and led to the cessation of our worship services and other in-person ministries, I was feeling a little downcast because I wondered how we would effectively minister to one another and how God's word would be proclaimed from our assembly. ## HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

- Since the previous edition of Life in the Vine which was published on March 20—coincident with the first restrictions that affected our worship (March 22)—we have gone from normal gathering for worship, to live-stream only (March 29), to small holy communion services (May 14), and back to COVID-safe physical gathering (July 5).
- Although we are gathering again, the live-streaming continues, as many people have indicated to us how this has been a blessing.
- I would like to extend a special thanks to those who have made this happen—notably Robert, Joel and Mark for delivering the technology, Greg for making it all look so easy in front of the camera, and Natasha for putting together the kid's ministry segments. That we went from normal worship to live-stream in the space of a week, and Greg went from mild-mannered metropolitan Pastor to Super-YouTube-man without skipping a beat nor harming any public phone boxes, are striking achievements.
- Remarkably, after a few live-streams the church suddenly changed colour, probably leaving viewers
  wondering if they had the right channel. Thank you to Roger and Denise once again for their
  handiwork with the paintbrush and roller.
- In coming back to church, you may have noticed two new large screen TVs, two new cameras, five new monitors on the PA bar, a new defibrillator, a new printer, and very astute observers would have also picked up that we are running new presentation software. Most of the costs (and the installation labour) of all of this new equipment has been donated by individual members to support our livestream (except the defibrillator of course, which was donated to protect our lives more than our livestream, though the role of the defibrillator in the live-stream announcements should not be overlooked). I would like to thank everybody who has supported us in this way.
- Another thankyou goes to Joel for his dedication in maintaining our social media channels. Social
  media has been the backbone of our information sharing whilst physical gathering has not been an
  option. It has been pleasing to see the growth in subscriptions and activity in our channels, as that
  helps maintain our community in all those hours that we are not meeting together each week.

- Church Council meetings held during this period were conducted using Zoom conferencing. Church Council started meeting again in person on July 20. The strategic planning that had been on the top of our agenda has been temporarily set aside whilst we deal with the more immediate problems and try to work out what the parameters of a future strategic plan might be.
- For the first time ever, our AGM was also held over Zoom, with 40 people attending. Key business was the passing of an updated budget for 2020 due to the many changes thrust upon us by COVID-19. Thank you to all for your support in running the business of the congregation.
- The early impact of the restrictions was a drop in April income of 17%. Cafe income was substantially impacted and anticipated income from fundraising activities went to zero. However, through to the end of July our net offerings from all sources (including the online donations introduced during the period of restrictions) have ended up being reasonably steady, and I would like to thank everyone in our community for your ongoing support through giving. Because our predicted (and actual) turnover dropped below the threshold to claim JobKeeper payments, we have been able to pass on the government support to our staff. The Federal Government has also provided extra support through Boosting Cashflow program payments. The net of all of these factors is that our bottom line is, for the moment, in a reasonably healthy situation despite the turmoil.
- We do not expect to continue to qualify for JobKeeper after September, which also coincides with the last of the Boosting Cashflow payments, so October onwards into next year holds a whole new set of financial challenges.
- We continue to plan towards holding our Fete on Sunday October 18, both as a fundraiser and a celebration of not having restrictions on our ability to gather...if, of course, we still have no restrictions at that stage.

From the middle of March families began to self-isolate, while we attempted to run as normal a program as possible. Unfortunately during this time our large corporate events, Worship and Assembly were suspended, parents were not allowed to enter classrooms and we began to focus on offering our curriculum on an online basis.

Second term was definitely better than we anticipated—with a full return to face to face teaching in the second week. We had expected to run an online program for at least half the term but thankfully this wasn't the case.

However, we had to be innovative with our corporate events. Assembly was not held for most of the term but towards the end of the term we began to live-stream into classrooms. Worship, an important part of our school fabric, was pre-recorded and several classes worshipped together (as per regulations). To maintain a sense of worshipping as a school we all worshipped with the pre-recorded service at the same time on a Friday morning. We had begun discussions about live-streaming Friday worship into classrooms (since we have great facilities to do this), but since the start of term 3 we have been able to worship as a whole school again (and have parents there as well!). It is a joy to be able to do this again and the enthusiasm of the students is a delight to behold.



While we could not worship together we never lost sight of the importance of continuing worship in some form to thank and praise God. It added to the workload of Mrs Zadow and a number of others, however, it was undertaken because of their desire and understanding of the call to worship which we have.

Unfortunately we have decided to suspend our Holy Communion practice for now. While this decision was difficult to make, a balance had to be found on the preparation time, the inability to touch for a blessing and the wearing of gloves and the student's interpretation of this. Hopefully we will be able to recommence this practice in the coming months.

When compared to other countries and even in Australia, we can be thankful for the mercies given to us in South Australia. We have been able to run a near 'normal' program (especially with teaching and learning) as possible. Some of our large school events eg. Special Persons Afternoon and Carols night have been cancelled for the year and we look forward to their return next year.

May God continue to look favourably on us.

A few highlights around the school in the last few weeks have been: replacement and addition of new flags in the courtyard which celebrate the various cultures in the school (38), a refurbishment of the Reception area and the construction of an outdoor learning area (funded by the State government). Who knew that a church like ours would be broadcasting to the world? We have new content uploaded almost daily through our weekly live-streams, through *Bible Study with Pastor Greg*, Pastor Greg's latest messages and the *God's Power* at Work at Golden Grove Testimony series.

Before the Coronavirus came to our shores our YouTube channel had steadily been ticking over with the Sunday messages being uploaded and every so often a new video was added to the testimony series. We had 34 subscribers in March this year; now we have an incredible 132 subscribers who see our videos uploaded (as long as they click the bell notification). Many people from across Australia have been tuning in, including from the Gold Coast, Canberra, and the Barossa Valley. It has been awesome hearing all the positive feedback about what people have been enjoying, and to see the various places they have been watching from. People have been making the most of the live-stream by tuning in from their holiday location, whether that is on the Yorke Peninsula or those who were in Belair for the Women's Retreat. There are also a lot of people who watch out livestream on YouTube who have not subscribed—if that's you, be sure to do it so you can stay up-to-date.

While YouTube is where we started our live-stream, not too long after we also began streaming to Facebook, which has roughly doubled the number of people seeing our stream. Our church page *likes* have also increased, similar to our YouTube subscribers—327 as of March 22 is now 356, and our followers are up from 330 to 372.

I view our Facebook page as a very unique way we can spread the Good News to our Facebook friends. The way the posts have been structured is to mainly be encouraging, scripture based posts; ones you can easily share to your Facebook profile. For those who may or may not have been seeing Pastor Greg's latest messages, there is a post that goes up on Wednesdays to remind you of what the key points in Pastor Greg's message were.

#### ASAROKA NEWS

Snippets of information and photos as received from Teacher Dan Sippon and Pastor Jacob Maso

- The first time COVID-19 was said to come, we all panicked and had to close for some weeks. However, social distancing and precaution were not strictly taken. We shared and continued to share beetul nut, smoke and socialise and did not take it seriously. But now we hear COVID has arrived at Pt Moresby. But we are not serious at all. Dan (teacher) is unsure how this is going to work for them but we are praying that God will take care of us. But we are also taking precaution. The Primary and the High school took preventive measures at the first outbreak. These facilities are still in place.
- Farm work is progressing well. As you know a new tractor was bought and is being used. Rice was planted and first plots have been harvested and rice is being milled. The rice will become a staple food at the school. The drying of the rice is happening in an area behind the principal's house.
- The rice launching has been postponed until September due to a COVID-19 outbreak at Port Moresby. A portion of the rice crop has been left and that will be used in a demonstration during the launch. Officers from the Prime Minister's Office are expected to attend.
- The tractor is being well used and is now ploughing the large farm behind the girl's dormitory. The Government authorities are showing a keen interest in this area for agriculture.

- A new double classroom will be built (2 on top and 2 at the bottom). The prisoners from Biuthe Prison are going to build it. They are residing at the school in a secure house and fenced area. They are doing other small jobs while waiting for materials from Lae. The classroom is a set design and pre-built by the company Atlast Steel Metal Manufacturing. It is a pilot project for the Eastern Highlands Provincial Government and is funded by the government.
- Internet is working. A small medium disk is set up at the staff room facing a mountain called Kiss. It's a Telikom setting and the school is paying 1000 Kina per month (about A\$400). Hope we continue with this arrangement. Wifi is on for students with smart phones and also connected to the student's computer lab and also the staff room. Sometimes the internet is down.
- We have a new Chaplain, Pastor Jack Kagamino.
   Installation was done and teachers and students have settled in for teaching and studies. The chaplain is very serious about his calling to Asaroka. The reach Out team are doing fine.
- The Len Tscharke Monument is up and a building is erected over it. It is progressing.

Please continue to keep Asaroka staff, students and community in your prayers. God is at work in the community and we need to continue thank God for these small improvements. Also pray that the COVID-19 doesn't spread to the school and that its threat is taken seriously by all. Thank God for the communication that both Dan and Jacob provide to us to keep us informed of what is happening. This is such a wonderful link.

#### BAND ON THE RUN

Again, being really careful of the restrictions and individual's health and work situations, a few members of each band individually recorded a bracket of songs for their primary Easter service—Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. There was also some additional recording of other worship songs so Robert and Greg had a reasonable portfolio to draw from, when preparing for the weekly live stream.

As tight restrictions began to ease, each band was able to get together and do more recordings. I know for my band, this was very welcome and an important way to reconnect with each other, especially as our lives routinely run in different directions. It felt so good to be able to worship together through our music again. It was also a chance to speak directly with each other and find out how each one of us had been affected by the pandemic situation. By this time (it's now May!), the live-stream worship team had developed their expertise in recording, mixing and producing what was needed for the services—to a very high level of professionalism, and the recordings flowed quite quickly (10 songs in two hours!!)

We're back!!! Hearing that face to face worship would be returning in July was a joyous event, although tinged with some apprehension... especially as the Live Stream service would be occurring simultaneously. What can the 'audience' see? Is the sound balanced? Is the sound the same online as we would hear it in the worship centre? What do we wear? What if we make a mistake? However, despite these trepidations, it has been SO GOOD to be able to worship together again and praise God through our music, and to see the joy of worship of the faces of those attending the service.

Are things the same as before? NO. The phrase *new normal* doesn't really capture it yet, as society is still evolving, recovering and working through what 'normal' will look like —and this could still be a long way off.

So, looking forward, we pray South Australia will be able to keep safe and healthy, so we can continue to worship together. And it's an awesome feeling to know our worship is allowing people across Adelaide, Australia and even overseas, to celebrate worship with us each week. - I. The Visiting Team will be officially installed at a service in the near future.
- 2. As part of becoming a Welcoming Church, new roles have been developed for Greeters and Morning Tea people.
- 3. Grant Hampel has been appointed as the Fellowship Event Coordinator and is preparing to hold several events during 2020.

Well thanks to COVID-19 restrictions:

- I. Worship services were cancelled so the Visiting Team installation has yet to be held. Plus, the Team were unable to physically visit members! *However*, there was a definite blessing in the Team being assembled just in time to be able to ring those members who were more isolated or vulnerable.
- 2. With regard to the Welcoming Church the planned training workshops for the new roles had to be cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions. And since worship services were cancelled anyway, there was no role to be undertaken! Once we knew services could resume, the roles were completely redefined (along with the roles for Communion Assistants) and training workshops were finally held. These new roles will probably remain in place until a COVID-19 vaccine is available.
- 3. Obviously, Grant has been unable to hold any events to date. His first involvement will be assisting with the Fete in October.


COVID-19 has caused havoc in so many areas, but it also provided surprising opportunities in several areas that we haven't previously recognised as a congregation, such as:

- The opportunity, as mentioned above, for the Visiting Team members to phone or email other members to maintain contact is something that can be developed further in addition to physical visits.
- Zoom meetings also open up opportunities to maintain contact when physical visiting is not possible.
- Streaming of our worship services is something that would probably never have been on the priority list for Golden Grove Lutheran Church. But God has blessed us with many dedicated and creative people who enabled us to stream our services right from the first Sunday—with only I week's notice! While streaming services is not specifically an area under the Pastoral Care Team, I do believe it provided (and continues to do so) a tremendous method for members to continue to feel connected and as such I am very grateful for those dedicated people involved.

#### CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

The decision to close Playgroup was the first to be made on 17th March due to the sudden outbreak and restrictions due to COVID-19 in our community.

This was a very sad time for me. Playgroup attracts many adults and children from our school and wider community and we love seeing them each Wednesday and Friday. They come and we sing, dance and have fun and the Worship Centre is alive and happy. Then suddenly with the closure of Playgroup, the Worship Centre was dark, the screen was not lit up, the toys and instruments were away and volunteers were all safe at home. But I personally felt lost. My ministry is about face to face interaction and then it was gone.......

I decided to develop *Natasha's Story Time* as an opportunity to reach out to families each fortnight to share how much we missed them. I filmed it in various parts of the church and surrounds showing how lonely and empty we are without them. I then read a story and a nursery rhyme and uploaded an activity for children and families to do at home. This followed the format and theme of our regular Playgroup. I had great feedback from many families and children that they felt so happy to see me. However, I was still left with the feeling of loss. I missed my interaction. Filming in an empty space for kids at home is not the same as interacting with 30 kids in front of me. Sadly I am no actor, I am not a Playschool presenter. I liked what I did and I had fun but it "didn't fill my cup".

After Playgroup was cancelled due to COVID the next of my ministry areas to be cancelled was Kids@Heart. Prior to COVID-19 I was presenting the children's address at the front of the church following the lectionary, naturally—like my teaching background entails—interacting with the kids in the front row, joking, bouncing ideas off each other and sharing some YouTubes. Then came COVID-19—kids were at home and I was to present online. This involved me coming into an empty church once a week and recording a children's message and trying to make it as interactive as possible with no children to interact with. I came up with the idea of having a regular craft segment and each week I would present some possible craft ideas children can make at home, then they can send a photo of it into me and I will share it as part of my address. I remember seeing this on TV shows as a child and I would wait in anticipation to see my work so I thought this would really engage our children.

So for 14 weeks I came in and presented and pre-recorded a children's message that related directly to Pastor Greg's sermon and was interactive for the children. It was challenging, it involved lots of computer animation, bible verses, interactive games, stories, laughter, and dance. It had its weekly challenges, and for now I am personally very glad it's over.

I love personally interacting with children and their families away from a camera and I am very excited to say the Wednesday Playgroup is recommencing August 12th.

- the ability to imaginatively explore ways to present the notices at the end of the service;
- the ability to negotiate the laws around copyright, concerning song clips etc;
- the ability to stay calm and troubleshoot when the inevitable hitches occurred.

Thank you for all your hard work.

From my point of view, as Worship Team leader, we had to rapidly revise our planned services, as more lockdowns occurred, and plan as much support as possible for those carrying out the work for the live-streamed services. All of this was undergirded by a determination to hold worship services of some description, throughout the entire period. We were not going to be beaten by a microscopic virus.

The positives that have come from our endeavours have been:

- the ability to present the word of God, Christian music and Pastor's message during a time of great stress and uncertainty;
- the ability to reach worshippers from far-off places, and those who find it hard to get to church, particularly in cold or wet weather;
- the ability for members to experience the service at other times if they were busy at 9:30 on a Sunday;
- the transition to Propresenter—a programme for setting up the slides for the service that we had been considering for some time but hadn't had the time to look at in depth;
- the development of Pastor Greg's online daily bible studies;
- the generous donation of equipment and programmes that will enable us to continue to provide live-streamed services for as long as needed.

Now that restrictions have eased, we have felt the joy of getting back together in person again, as we navigate through how the current rules affect the way we do things. We are also in the process of working out what is needed to continue live-stream services into the future.

Worship Team is due to meet again next week, when we will review the past 6 weeks of services and plan for how we can sustain live-streaming and live services in the long term.

It's been a real blessing for us to be able to view and be a part of your services with your online streaming services. We have not missed one since we have not been able to attend our own church services at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church Horsham. You have a wonderful pastor in Pastor Greg being able to get the message across without any notes as a reminder, his addresses are very easily understood. We feel as though we are a part of your congregation as we have attended your church with our son and his family in the past. Now with an average of 130 to 150 views on YouTube you have created a mission into the community of perhaps up to 300 people. It would be nice if you could continue this outreach mission because Victoria and New South Wales are still struggling with COVID-19 and cannot attend church services. 





# PAPER, COFFEE, COVID

Since March, Golden Grove Lutheran Church, Café Connect and office administration has seen many changes. Life in the church office has been quite different since COVID-19 came to visit Australia. With the onset of new restrictions and the daily updates and continuous changes, keeping ahead in all areas became quite a challenge.

The first area of ministry that experienced change was the cancellation of Wednesday playgroup and Friday Mainly Music sessions. This was quickly followed by the restrictions on all Church services set by Government, Health Departments and LCA authority. We immediately began planning for live-streamed services and resolving the challenges this presented.

One area that challenged us was copyright restrictions. This was clearly seen during our Easter Sunday service, where the live-stream was taken down due to an infringement from rebroadcasting a YouTube video. Obtaining a live-stream licence through CCLI allowed us to broadcast songs and lyrics after bands came in through the weeks recording for services. Thank you to all the band members for their commitment and cooperation, as we now have a library of over forty songs that we can use in times of need.


Another area we found challenging was producing a high-quality live-stream service. The main issue that we encountered was that our camera equipment was outdated and inadequate for this purpose. Initially borrowing a digital SLR to overcome this problem, we were blessed with the donation/purchase of new cameras. Software for live-streaming was found and quickly learnt with better processes becoming evident as services continued.

One area I personally found myself quickly learning was video producing/editing, which proved to be quite time consuming and exhausting. This included all areas of service from recording bands, Natasha's weekly children's messages, bible readings, prayers and various other segments, then editing them into the finished product that was viewed each Sunday. One area that was enjoyable was producing the "opening" video, introducing a creative element to the service based on the theme of the week—especially the use of a drone to produce a different perspective.

An interesting point that evolved from editing was the amount of time needed to record, edit and complete each recorded segment. On average, it has been calculated that YouTubers take up to 30+ minutes for basic video editing for each minute of video, which I can fully understand. For example—Maundy Thursday devotion video (35 minutes) took over 10 hours to complete from start to finish. Another example is song recording taking on average 1 hour per song to record, edit and add lyrics. This saw the majority of time being consumed in this new area, putting pressure on other areas for the office.

One area of pressure came from Café Connect with the onset of restrictions and new practices. Trade became takeaway only due to Government regulations and saw the introduction of online ordering through a new café website. As sales reduced, stock control became quite important in areas of use-by dates and availability of takeaway products. Restrictions in purchasing quantities also became challenging especially in milk products—at times only being able to purchase from day to day. Lockdown restrictions also saw vacancies in volunteers with Pastor Greg and myself filling in most days. As restrictions relax, sales have slowly increased with new volunteers coming on board which we are truly thankful for.



There were many other areas in the office that saw change. This included how we communicated to our members each week by a new format of weekly newsletter, updating our new website to include children's ministry artwork and weekly readings and more content released through social media. As restrictions eased, new practices were investigated and implemented for small communion services whilst still social distancing and contact tracing. As live church services resumed, new practices in morning tea, greeting/ushering and holy communion were investigated and implemented whilst keeping in line with government restrictions.

Although we did experience difficult and stressful situations, we did encounter many blessings. Live-streaming has opened many opportunities of ministering to many different audiences from new viewers, shutins, interstate viewers and our own travelling members being able to join us on Sunday mornings. This has led to many donating to new equipment with the encouragement to keep this service active. Although COVID-19 has thrown up many challenges, there are also many blessings that we can be thankful for.




