Thanks Judith


Judith started in the first week of Spring - September, 1991. 18-22 deg C that week. Fine. No rain. Perfect spring day to springboard her new career.

Judith's time has been just shy of 28 years. About 1/3 of a lifetime. That's 10,162 days ago, 1452 weeks. Judith would have produced about 1400 church newsletters, sent countless emails, taken countless phone calls, counselled countless people. She has seen off 4 pastors, 4 school principals, 9 chairpersons (actually 10 since we count John Fielke twice). 28 years of loyalty and dedication deserves a lot of respect, particularly having to work in such intolerable conditions in the early years (no Google). To me, Judith's work ethic is exemplified by the photo below, of her lugging part of a tree around in the firewood fundraiser (the one in the picture is just a twig, I have seen her shifting chunks of trunk that look about twice her size - tumbling end to end, rolling it down the hill, bit by bit encouraging it to its final destination. Then she goes and gets another one, and another. This steadiness and persistence is the hallmark of Judith.

In recent years, Con Schlenk (involved in children's ministry in Cambodia) produced a small bible book for Cambodian mission, with artwork depicting the characters as Cambodian and in their Khmer language. His mission was to print them in bulk and give them to small children as a "Good News Reader". This was supported wholly by Lutherans in SA & the outreach work of Trans World Radio (TWR). This reader has gospel stories in full colour and the thirst for this book is vast. The radio station received more than 2000 thank you letters from children who had heard the broadcasts in the first few months of broadcasting.

Daniel Dutschke's brother Matt was aware of these and after his trip to Kenya and Uganda last year (2018) wondered if a similar thing could be done in Africa. After discussions with Con Schlenk and the same artist who did the original paintings, the book has been reproduced for an African audience. The pictures have been redone with a generic African look and the words have been reset to English as per request by his contacts in Africa. Matt's goal is to get them printed in Kenya (with the first batch of 10,000) about to go to print. He has financed all costs to set this up himself. His aim is to give out 1,000,000 of these over the next few years.

A very small run was just printed in Adelaide and Daniel purchased 10 from Matt that were taken on the trip to PNG for them to look at and see if they will be suitable for their ministry.

2019 GGLC & GGLPS Team visit our partners in Asaroka PNG

August 16th a team of 7 left for Goroka in the Eastern Highlands with the goal of connecting again with our brothers & sisters at Asaroka. This partnership began under the leadership of the late Len Tscharke in 2006 with the aim of encouraging & supporting the Asaroka community both in faith & in material items. Although the partnership is formally with Asaroka Lutheran Secondary School our friendship & assistance has extended to the Elementary & Primary schools & the surrounding community that supports the Secondary School. This is the first trip without Len & Claire Tscharke, although their son Ken who was born in PNG continues to be an important member of our team. His knowledge and understanding of both culture and Pidgin is vital to the success of each visit & the partnership. A wooden plaque was presented to the Asaroka Community to acknowledge the work of Reverend Tscharke in both establishing the school and the partnership.

We were welcomed on arrival by Jacob, Dan, Chaplain Benson & others at the airport & then taken to the guest house where we spent time together in prayer & the organization of activities for the week. These special people looked after us all week, spending each day with us, taking time out of their work to devote time with us.

On the first Sunday we worshipped with our dear friends at St John's, Goroka & Pastor Greg had the privilege of sharing God's Word. On the last Sunday we worshipped & shared Holy Communion with our Christian family at Asaroka. During this service we were privileged to witness the young people of the 'outreach team' hand over to the incoming 'outreach team'. The passion and servant hearts these young people have for the Lord was touching & uplifting. A German missionary, his wife and group of young men from Germany were also part of this service.

During the week we travelled on the school bus out to Asaroka (approx 1 hour on both bitumen and very bad dirt roads) each day. On the Monday we were on our way to the High School when we were stopped by the Primary School. They were waiting to welcome us and to worship with us, giving thanks to God for the partnership and Pastor Len. Each team member was then allocated a class to spend time in. What a wonderful, joyous occasion. On arrival at the High School, much later than expected, we were part of the assembly. Standing in front of 2500 students can be quite daunting but we offered words of encouragement for their faith journey.

A tour of the school and its buildings, a visit to the water source all helped us gain an appreciation of the many needs of the school, the work that has been done & work still needing to be done. There were many opportunities for us to chat with staff, the Principal Aki Olisagave, & Chaplain Benson. The final Saturday was shared with the 'outreach team' at the camp mumu. As this is my third visit, there was a feeling of 'coming home', which was very comforting and welcoming, and I was looking forward to seeing many familiar faces – and was not disappointed.

It was very special to be able to spend time in the classroom, both with the Primary School Year 6 class, & with the Elementary School reception class. These children are being well educated, and in English, from an early age.

I thought I'd teach the reception children 'Twinkle, twinkle, little star' – but when I started, they chimed in perfectly. The teacher explained they find learning English through rhyme and song is very effective.

The Year 6 class were interested to learn about Australia – just as they learn much about PNG. They asked very intelligent questions about the land, people and industry. And the only question to stump me: What is Australia's main economy? (I now know this is mining – followed closely by

agriculture & education) Will I be returning again? Definitely! Papua New Guinea has a firm place in my heart, E-tru!

Money was taken with the team to PNG for the elementary teachers to choose items that they needed from the shops in Goroka.

We can praise God for all these blessings and the many others that haven't been mentioned. May God continue to bless this school, the relationship between the school and congregation and our community.








"Life's a Beach"



- ...Crossings & Comfort Zones...





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Highlights from Church Council

Jon Schutz - GGLC Chairperson

*Budget — At the AGM, 21 ways were presented in which members can help to bolster the budget bottom line through a mix of volunteering, supporting fundraising programs and donation or regular giving. Roughly 3 months since the AGM, we are seeing the effects as people fulfil their undertakings through the Day Pay Challenge or once-off gifts, & increased regular giving. At this moment it is tricky to get a good fix on our long term budget position because of the difficulty in separating long term trends from once-off gifts, but it is certainly clear that our situation has improved. We will have an accurate update on our budget position later in the year. Thank you all for your support.

*Firewood – Thank you also to everyone who helped out with our firewood fundraiser this year. We sold almost 13 tonnes of firewood & raised \$4700.



*Deck and Playground – Construction of the verandah over the deck started on July 24th. Pipes in all the wrong places caused some challenges but the builders completed their work on August 13. In parallel a team of our volunteers have worked on the deck & play area – setting the levels, installing drainage, building borders, filling & levelling the play area base, setting up pylons for the deck, installing deck joists, installing soft fall mats,

assembling play equipment, securing the decking, & reinstating the paving. Preparation for oiling the deck & installing the balustrade fence have begun. In what can only be a conspiracy, more pipes and old footing found their way exactly to the places where we need to dig for the fence spigots. Roughly 400 hours of volunteer effort have been invested so far, including quite a few due to conspiratorial pipework. A big thank you to every

*Fete – The organising committee has been meeting regularly to plan for the café opening celebration fete on October 20.

*Chairs - Replacement of the aging & failing Worship Centre chairs is the last major component of our renovations program. One year ago Church Council assessed the options & made a decision albeit a compromise, as the preferred option was out of budget range - but that was soon put on hold after we received new information which affected the basis of the decision. Budget status as relayed at the AGM left us without expectation of being in a position to pursue the chairs. However, we have now been able to place an order! With some ongoing negotiations on price coupled with support from the school, we have arrived at a workable solution. The school will pay the full amount for the chairs initially, & the congregation will reimburse our 50% share over the next year & a half. The chairs are high-back Trilogy chairs that received the best overall response when the options were trialled by the congregation & school last year. 192 will be in "beam seat" configuration (like our existing brown chairs) & 108 as single seats. We thank the school for agreeing to an arrangement that makes this purchase possible.

*Staff changes — Judith finished almost 28 years of service as office secretary at the end of June. We welcome Robert Mills into the new position as Office/Café Coordinator. Our Youth Coordinator Paul Voigt will be stepping down from at the end of the year. We thank Paul for his outstanding work of the last 2 ½ years & wish him all the best as he settles into married life with Jess.
