Praising God

Let everything that has breath praise the Lord. Psalm 150:6

In the bible we see how breath is linked to God's gift of life. In the creation narrative, God breathes the breath of life into Adam and he becomes a living being (Gen 2:7) and many other passages make this connection. In Psalm 150 the writer implores all creation, those who have received life because of God's will and action, to praise God for his gift. More than that, the Psalmist encourages all to see that praise is as natural as breath.

We often see praise as something we only do in a formal worship setting. As we gather with other believers, we all sing the same words and we are joined by God's Holy Spirit who unifies us with each other and with heavenly worship. It is a beautiful spiritual event that changes our hearts and opens us to his word. Recently when we were unable to gather together to worship we hungered to be reunited and experience the miracle of worship through praise. While there is no doubt some challenges arose during our COVID-induced lockdowns, they also allowed us to appreciate the blessing we receive as we praise.

God the Father encourages us to praise him not just in church but in other times and places as well. Our homes are a natural place for worship and yet we often don't even mention God in our time with family at home. As we witness God's breath of life shaping and leading our community, we join with the Psalmist and all things which have breath to praise Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

Back in the days of yore, when knights roamed the countryside, there was a tradition inherited from the Ancient Greeks and Romans to view life in 7-year phases. At the age of seven, a boy would qualify to become a page (a nobleman's assistant), at 14 a squire (a knight's attendant), and then at 21 the squire was eligible to become a knight — which is why to this day we still hold the 21st birthday as a significant celebration (according to the Internet).

The squire had to master what we now see as Olympic sports — riding, swimming, shooting, wrestling, fencing, long jump — and dancing — apparently while wearing armour, which presumably led to a fairly low success rate, particularly on the swimming leg. Fortunately there was not a lot of riding, swimming, shooting, wrestling, fencing, long jump or dancing at the Salt Factory 21st celebration and consequently it was quite a success. As was the Trivia Night just one week later, where there were unfortunately no questions about knights and 21st birthdays. But I was prepared — perhaps next time.

And indeed there should be a next time. The Trivia Night well fits the bill of intergenerational activities that we wish to foster at GGLC. Our worship communities at GGLC tend to have little overlap — we offer two worship opportunities at different times and with different styles, and for the most part, people make the same choice each week — which is entirely reasonable but leads to little interaction between the communities. So it is good that we can have these other events - like the Trivia Night, our Salt Factory 21st celebration and 30th anniversary a few years ago, the Fete, the Pong, our Christian Education days, Worship-in-the-Park, AGM/HYM business meetings, craft days, community barbecues and even working bees where we can come together as an integrated community.

Soon after this edition of LITV hits the printers, it will be time for our Half-Yearly Meeting. This will be an historic meeting, being the first time to not be held in conjunction with the GGLPS Annual Election Meeting due to the constitutional updates that were passed at the recent AGM. Whilst this year's budget is reasonably on track, the Finance Team has prepared the 2022 budget and it presents some challenges. As I have mentioned before, income from Café Connect and the Fete are an increasingly important element of our annual budget, so thank you to all the volunteers who have supported and continue to support our fundraising efforts. The Fete has been well-covered elsewhere in this edition, but I will just say once more a thank you to all in our community who worked so hard to make it an outstandingly successful day.

I am sure that when you read "budget" and "fete" in the same sentence you will immediately think of Lesley who has been our Treasurer since 2018 and led the fete team since the first event in 2019. Lesley will be stepping down from the Treasurer role at the end of this year, and on behalf of the congregation I would like to thank her for her diligent bookkeeping and many a late night on the spreadsheets. I am pleased to share with you all that Lesley will be continuing as Fete Director and that, given how the fete now sits as a central component of our budget and our mission to the community, the Fete Director will also be an ex-officio position on Church Council.

We hope to shortly make an announcement about the appointment of a Children and Family Ministry Leader starting next year. Lisa, who has kindly filled the gap for us since Natasha stepped down for health reasons earlier this year, will be finishing her role in December — a big thanks to Lisa for helping out during this period.

Have you had the jab? Pastor John Henderson, before his recent retirement as Bishop of the LCANZ, wrote <u>A Pastoral Note on Vaccines and Passports</u>¹ to address issues ranging from the ethics of vaccines to the fairness of requiring immunisations in certain settings. In short, members of the LCA are encouraged to take advantage of the vaccines on offer and to trust that our governments are acting according to God's will for them to be a good agent for the ordering of society, putting in place rules to protect us.

Whilst we as a congregation are not impacted directly by any vaccine mandates for either staff, volunteers or worshippers at this stage, we are working hand in hand with a primary school that is (from the end of this term) — and in turn that will impact our staff who work with the school in various ways. Also, staff and volunteers who visit aged care facilities in SA are required to have had the double-dose. We are still in the early days of living with COVID-19 in SA in a largely vaccinated population, and as we head toward the end of a school year, a Christmas season where travel is again permitted, and then into the new year of holidays and back to school, a lot could change. Indeed, we should be prepared for some degree of vaccination requirements for church — let's hope that worship always remains free to all, but conceivably staff and volunteers or those working with children or older people could come under a mandate. In Victoria, worship is affected by different requirements on gatherings for vaccinated and unvaccinated/unscreened. So please be prepared!

Praise God for a wonderful day at our recent fete!

Praise God for the beautiful weather! Huge numbers of families enjoyed the free entry event. Attendance was counted at 2600, staying within COVID limits of 1000 on site at a time. The site looked fabulous and our facilities worked like a dream. Hospitality was served up in spades! Praise God for the generosity of all those on the organising committee and all volunteers who pulled together a successful event.

Praise God for the people who ran 56 market stalls selling a multitude of goods, 11 food stalls, 23 attractions (12 external and 11 GGLC) and 4 local clubs promoting their activities. GGLC ran stalls selling cakes and produce, handmade crafts, olive products, raffle tickets, and a range of lunch options, as well as running the ticketing for the pony rides and face painters. The cake stall was a huge hit and predictably, all baked goods were cleared. These plus the Cafe and Devonshire tea were busy all day and we extend a huge vote of thanks to the volunteers on all of the stalls.

John Fielke's "Olives No more" brand had great exposure and olive lovers in the North East walked away very happy with baskets full of them! Thank you John for your support, with olive sales benefitting the church.

We praise God for the many people who volunteered diligently and cheerfully and helped us bless the community. There were a number of primary and high school aged children who helped with setting up the site, preparing food, serving customers and packing up. We thank these children immensely for their serving hearts in action.









GGLPS ran a hospitality tent and the courtyard food stall, the school choir sang, there was a student artwork display, the Parents and Friends Association covered the costs of the bouncy castles, and BBQ Trailer Hire SA (a school family business) loaned us the BBQ trailer. There were several terrific examples of kid entrepreneurship at the fete. Sophia Chinca, GGLPS year 6 (and family) ran a traditional lemonade stand on the oval (see Sophia's article next page) and we encourage other school families to give some consideration to getting the kids involved in the future. Thank you to all from GGLPS for your support - to Will and the staff, students and P&F.

The public address system was beautifully set up this year, with crystal clear sound. We certainly praised God "with the strings" (Ps 150:4) and songs through our worship service, Salt Factory band and school choir. The announcements and music sounded clearer than ever. We praise God for the recent investments in the sound equipment and to the sound-guys who put their skills to work.

We are gaining valuable experience in running this event and implementing improvements every year. This year we introduced a ticketing system for face painting/henna body art and pony rides—patrons could buy a ticket with a time slot on it to save queuing—and this was widely welcomed. Face painting/body art tickets still sold out even though we increased the time from two hours (last year) to a total of 12 hours! The indication is that we need to keep increasing the number of attractions and food options at the fete to cater for the ever increasing crowds. Praise God for a problem such as this!

Free entry, free or low-cost activities all round and a smorgasbord of raffle prizes were all made possible through the support of sponsors—major sponsors were Paradise Mazda, Stratco and Inspiring Strength in Women—and donors including the P&F and many individuals in our community. A Community Grant from the Tea Tree Gully Council was also an enormous help. Thank you!!








TRIVIA NIGHT

On February 11th 2022 we have our annual Opening BBQ and Games (combined junior youth and youth event, be sure to put this date in your diaries.




PING PONG-A-THON

<u>MORGAN – MURRAY RIVER – 18th</u> <u>September</u>


Pleasant weather welcomed 27 fishers in the morning followed by a slight shower late afternoon. Carp catches were down on expectation with 15, weighing in with a total of 8.5kg. Peter Van Loggem organised a sausage sizzle for lunch with use of the School BBQ trailer. Morgan has many historic sites, a ferry and local cafes for coffee etc. Senior winner was Lou Goegan with a 48cm Carp. Runners up were Meredith Glaetzer and David Ware. Tea at the Commercial Hotel attracted 20 GGAF members.



MARION BAY CAMP - 22 to 24 October

The annual camp at the Marion Bay Caravan Park was attended by 40 people. The Park was excellent with great facilities including a Camp Kitchen and well set up Fish Cleaning Area (best many have ever experienced). Keen fishers endured a windy and cold weekend. Whilst the beach fishing did not produce a fish the Marion Bay and Stenhouse Bay jetties were productive with catches totaling 57 – total weight 8.87 kg. The main species caught were Squid, Tommy Ruffs and Garfish together with a mixture of Leatherjacket, Weedy Whiting and Rock Cod. Saturday winners were Mark Caldicott with largest Squid - .95 kg and Graeme Hoklas with heaviest fish – a Leatherjacket. Chris Simanis successfully landed 13 well above average size Garfish.

All enjoyed the Saturday night BBQ thanks to "caterers" Christine McCulloch and Peter Van Loggem and those who assisted with the preparation. The short Sunday morning fishing session was quiet. Keith Scott landed the only catch, being a .35kg Squid.







PORT NOARLUNGA JETTY - 6th November

GGAF revisited Port Noarlunga Jetty (last event was in 2015). 17 fishers braved what was forecast to be a windy and wet day however the weather was kind with only a brief shower midafternoon. 13 legal Salmon Trout and 1 Leatherjacket were caught together with many undersize fish including Trevally.
