

It was rusty, had missing parts and wasn't the latest model. I really didn't see any love in dad's actions. Over the next few weeks we restored that bike, together. When it was finished it was beautiful and just what I wanted. The hours dad and I spent together were amazing and I still treasure them. I have never felt more loved as I got to know my dad so much better we created stuff together. At every step dad was loving me and working for my good, it just took me a while to recognise it.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

Have you ever had someone walk in through your front door, kick over your pot plants and then occupy your living room while using up your Netflix bandwidth leaving you to cower in your bedroom for two years waiting for the unsavoury guest to make an exit? Well, me neither, but that seems analogous to how COVID-19 has treated us all. It is looking like said guest is now starting to have trouble finding anything new and interesting to watch on said streaming channel so might leave sometime soon. With the recent rounds of relaxations of restrictions, mask-wearing stands as the last bastion of the impositions we have seen on worship and other church activities and in a mixed metaphor kind of way, we can see light at the end of the tunnel.

There may be a few calamities waiting in the wings to fill the anticipated void when COVID-19 subsides - Japanese encephalitis and the Ukraine War are leading the pack - but let us continue to pray that the world can return to relative peace and to a semblance of what we remember as normal, in the not-distant future.

Meanwhile, Church Council has carried on with the business of governance as best we can, although a significant amount of time has had to be invested in working through vaccination and other COVID-19-related matters. Financial matters, staffing, property and strategic planning would be the other main areas of focus in recent times:

- The unaudited surplus for the 2021 financial year is \$4275, which is helpful in offsetting the budget deficit planned for this year (\$5655). Full details will follow at the AGM in May.
- With Lauren starting as Children and Family Ministry Leader, change is afoot new formats, new names, new tech the article by Lauren and Joel contains all of the details. We are excited to see where these changes will lead.
- We are pleased to be one of the recipients of an LLL 100 Year Anniversary Grant, which are grants for the purpose "to bring together your congregation's community in the name of the LLL's 100 year anniversary of serving the Lutheran Church of Australia". "We didn't even know there was a church here" is a phrase we hear regrettably often from our community, so we plan to use the grant to make some more prominent signage for the church and Café Connect, hopefully putting our presence in Wynn Vale beyond any doubt.

- We are also considering the possibility of adding a pedestrian gate on the corner of Richardson Drive and Sunnybrook Drive, to make access to the church and cafe a little more obvious to passers-by. A small part of the car park will have to be appropriated to make room for some steps and a new pedestrian path.
- On other property matters, some of you may have noticed a new refrigerator in the Fellowship Centre kitchen, the new coats of paint in the Fellowship Centre and particularly around the windows, and some new grass and paving at the manse. Thanks Roger!
- The youth have also been busy, upgrading the carpet in the youth area and some outside lighting.
- I have mentioned Strategic Planning on a number of occasions over the last few years. In one sense, it is something that a governing body is doing constantly, but in this case we have been working specifically to revisit all of our Mission, Vision and Values statements and planning objectives as a whole, in a process that started in late 2017 but has had one or two interruptions. Starting with our next meeting in late March, Allen Kupke - with his significant experience in corporate leadership - will be joining our Church Council meetings as a Consultant to help lead us through the remaining parts of the process.

It was a pleasure to be joined by Tony Zappia and Blair Boyer last Sunday (March 20) for the installation of Tammie as our incoming Board Chair, Linden Huxtable as one of our new Board members, and for our new staff - Kylie Chinca (Reception and Enrolments Officer), Melissa Bishop (Teacher of Japanese), Naomi Ali (Teacher of Music), Melissa Emmett (Year 5/6 teacher) and Evie Donoghue (School Counsellor).

Despite the impact of COVID we have enjoyed a number of events and we are thankful to our P & F Association for their support of many of these including pancakes for Shrove Tuesday, hot cross buns for Middle of Term Breakfast and orange donuts for Harmony Day. We also have two 3D printers installed, along with a range of science equipment that the P & F have kindly donated to the school which will enable the children to design, engineer and create a range of items and will be a great supplement to our curriculum.

Harmony Day proved to be a key highlight of the term thus far, with the children (and staff!) rejoicing in the opportunity to celebrate and share their traditional cultures, foods and dress. We enjoyed a Harmony Day parade on the oval which also include a special Chapel Service with a focus on the Harmony theme and the installation of our student leaders for this year.

Our students have also enjoyed a special Dance workshop, arranged by our Music Teacher, Mrs Naomi Ali, and our student leaders were able to participate in an online leadership seminar with Mr Sean Gordon OAM who recounted his experiences in leading the response to the Thredbo disaster and the founding of the School Aid charity to encourage philanthropy in primary school students, The leaders found Sean's presentation to be very motivating and inspiring.

Progress is continuing with our Buildings and Facilities Master Planning with a visit from the Block Grant Authority committee coming up later in March, following which we anticipate being advised of the funding we are likely to receive towards our next stages of building which include a new classroom and gymnasium.

We have continued to enjoy livestreamed Chapel services and assemblies this term, which have proven to be a positive way of helping our students and school families continue to be strongly engaged with our weekly worship services on a Friday morning, which are a hallmark of the strong sense of community that the school enjoys.

Vine Kids





This year our Sunday program has taken on a new format. We have changed from Kids @ Heart to Vine Kids. Each week, the children from birth to year 6 are invited to come and join in with quiet activities at the front of the church before the children's message. Quite often there are children in the areas before church even begins. We often see Riley (my son) and Teddy (Pastor Greg's grandson) have a hello embrace when they see each other. What a joy to see the next generation so excited to be at church.

After the children's message, we go out the back for a story and activity. This term we have been exploring the life of Jesus between Christmas and his birth and the Easter story. This is to fill in the gaps to show that Jesus grew up and did lots of learning and teaching between being born and dying for our sins.

The activities that the children join in with are wide and varied. We have had some craft activities, but also had opportunities to explore and create through cooking, playdough, coloured rice and movement activities. We even got to make pancakes when looking at Shrove Tuesday and the beginning of Lent.

A highlight for me so far has been getting to know the children through these activities and being able to have lots of conversations about the life of Jesus. I especially enjoyed being able to look at the story of Jesus first miracle and experimenting with water changing colour.


Champ Programs

INTEGRITY JIUJITSU

My name is Dominique Liddle and I run Brazilian jiujitsu classes at GGLC with my partner Bochere Rand.

I have been running classes through the church and school for 8 years now. We were lucky enough to start off in Golden Time, largely thanks to Darryl Trigg and Luke. During my 13 year journey I have seen firsthand the positive changes it has provided to both adults and children and I can't recommend it enough!

Brazilian jiujitsu teaches you to think, how to use technique and timing to overcome strength and aggression. It teaches you to solve problems with your brain and not your fists. Along with this it teaches the traditional values of respect, humility, patience, dedication, responsibility and team work.

It gives children confidence, empathy, good work ethic and improves their fitness. Both my daughters have been training since they were 5 and love it. It has provided them both with an inner strength that I am grateful for – especially as they head into their teenage years!

What are You doing now? - Allyson Dutschke

I have been asked this question multiple times since leaving early childhood lecturing with TAFE SA at the end of 2019. After a couple of years working out what I did want to do, I have recently begun running my own business as a Child Protection Trainer and Child Safe Organisation consultant (and I even built myself a website):

As some will be aware, I have been training in the Child Protection field since 2008. Currently, I deliver a number of different training courses – including the Dept. for Education Responding to Risks of Harm, Abuse & Neglect in Education and Care (RRHAN-EC) 4-hour Masterclass, and also the DHS Child Safe Environments – Through their Eyes, 7hr training. Each week, I'm delivering at least one of these courses – sometimes face-to-face, but increasingly online. I certainly appreciate having the opportunity to base my face-to-face classes in the Fellowship Centre – with access to a convenient location, car parking and great facilities; while also still learning about operating a small business (without it taking over my life).

As for the rest of the week, you'll see me fortnightly, volunteering at the Café, and (after 10 yrs!) still leading one of the Sunday morning worship bands. Oh, and in my (spare) time, working on my PhD in Education, through Adelaide Uni – although the research is done, the job of writing it all up continues. Now – with the borders open again – Daniel and I hope to travel again to more places across Australia.

So, what is God's plan for me - I'm still finding that I need to stop, step back from my ideas, and listen to His direction. Each day, each step, is guided by His hand. I know He won't let me stumble and fall, but He's certainly taken me along some paths I did not expect (and I'm sure there are more adventures to come!).

Are people listening to your message?

ROSTRUM find your voice

Do you ever wish you had better communication skills? You are not alone. A survey on the topic shows people fear speaking in front of a group more than

financial failure or even death! Like most things we learn to communicate affectively by doing, practising in a friendly atmosphere and by receiving individual constructive feedback by an experienced individual.

Is it important to have good communication skills? It certainly is, even more so with the evolution of electronic communication which seems to be taking over our lives. Sadly, we are becoming less and less able to communicate effectively on a face-to-face basis.

Having good communication skills is invaluable in all aspects of our life; job centred, relationships, and spiritual. The ability to get your message across is essential. No matter how clever you are, your opinions and knowledge tend to be wasted unless you can get your message across to others.

You could improve your communication skills by enrolling in a very expensive high-pressure course. It may work, at least initially, but unless you keep practising you are unlikely to maintain the level of proficiency you are looking for. A far better option is to join a club specialising in helping you develop communication and meeting skills such as chairing meetings, taking minutes and generally participating in meetings. All of these things can be taught in a friendly, non-threatening environment.

You don't have to travel far to find exactly the help you need to develop these skills. On the first and third Tuesday of each month 'Rostrum Club 20' meets at the Lutheran Fellowship Centre at Wynn Vale. Meetings start at 7.30pm sharp and conclude around 9.30pm.

You would be very welcome to come along as a visitor and see how our club works. You can be assured of a stimulating, entertaining, non-threatening experience. You won't even be asked to participate at that meeting unless you particularly wish to. Should you eventually decide to join us membership is extremely affordable.

Rostrum 20 has a long association with the Church/School having been a hirer of your excellent facilities for many years. We are thankful to the late Ken Campbell, who was a founding member of our club, a member of your church and hard-working school volunteer. Ken was an amazing person who went out of his way to assist others. Ken was able to guide us in accessing your facilities.

In memory of Ken, we have decided to hold an annual 'Short Notice Speech Competition' in his honour, the first running of the event will be on April 5th. 

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING – 13th February 2022


