

The Water Of Life

Then he showed me a river of the water of life, clear as crystal, coming from the throne of God and of the Lamb, in the middle of its street. On either side of the river was the tree of life, bearing twelve kinds of fruit, yielding its fruit every month; and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations. *Revelation 22:1-2*

We have seen water do lots of damage over the last year or so. Floods have literally washed away homes and destroyed towns. Wild weather has seen torrents of water bombard the land creating all sorts of havoc. When we see a river swollen with floodwater rising quickly, we sense the danger and get as far away as we can. Water is powerful and can take life. Water can reshape landscapes permanently.

Water is also refreshing. Water is life-giving. When the expeditions to Mars first touched down on the red planet the one question that had to be answered was 'is there any water that could sustain life?'. In the midst of a desert or a dry spell, we crave water. When deprived of water for a day or so, we would do almost anything to get it. No wonder there are so many references to water in the Bible. Isaiah talks about God's protection from the raging water and the turbulent sea while Revelation describes the water of life that proceeds from God himself. God's Holy Spirit, his word and water all work together in the Bible. Water is used to cleanse if joined with the word of God and gives new life in baptism. Paul even goes further and uses the imagery of being completely submerged, just as if we were buried, as we die to the old person and rise from the water as a Spirit-filled new person. God is in the renewal business and water is synonymous with that action.

Just as water provides life for the plants that line the streets of the new Jerusalem, the picture in Revelation is of healing that comes from the throne of God via the tree of life. We can be trees of life in a dry and dying world. We encounter disorder and decay in a world that is broken and separated from God. We have the calling to bring people to the river of life. As we soak in the refreshing water of God's Spirit, we encourage those who need renewing to do the same. May this Christmas be a time of rejuvenation by God. 
HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

Seeing or hearing the soothing sounds of moving water triggers a response in our brains that induces a flood of neurochemicals. These chemicals increase blood flow to the brain and heart, which induces relaxation. - The Internet

Many of us have a conditioned response to the burbling noise of water which is other than relaxing. If you are one of those people and after getting started with this water-themed edition of Life in the Vine now find yourself reading your copy in the smallest room in the house, then you will be in the best place to celebrate the expensive sewer repair that we had done just prior to the Fete. It was the time of the PingPongAThon ("The Pong") when the Fellowship Toilets blocked. The plumber sent the inspection camera down and what it showed was not pretty. Getting the sewer relined was literally money down the drain but not one person on Church Council voted for saving the money and having a blocked toilet instead. It is cases like these where we can all take comfort in the wise judgement of our Church Council. But regrettably this was another blow to a somewhat strained budget.

We will be discussing budget matters shortly at our Half Yearly Meeting. Having gone to our Finance Team Meeting in November with a projected end of year deficit of \$17k, in recent weeks we received a deluge of budget catch-up donations which have brought our projected position back to a more manageable figure and I would like to extend an enormous thankyou to the members who gave extra to help out. The shortfall was partly due to once-off situations - a new kitchen fridge, the sewer repair, a shortfall in Fete revenue due to the lovely wet weather - but of somewhat more concern is the ongoing downward trend in offerings income whilst salary and other costs continue to rise. Cafe and Fete incomes help us to keep our heads above water but we are swimming against the tide.

Prompted by budget trends and because the existing manse is no longer serving its purpose as well as it might, we will be discussing a proposal to purchase a new manse at the HYM - with the hope of both finding something more suitable and making a modest gain that can be used to pay down some of our loans. Our Constitution requires Congregational approval for such a purchase.

Although this year's Fete fell short of budget, it was nevertheless more profitable than previous years. This is a reflection of the strong reputation that our event has established. Please see the separate Fete report for more details. We are very conscious of the load that is placed on several individuals who are heavily involved in the planning in the months prior to the day, and will be putting in place measures next year to reduce the load on all volunteers whilst still offering a similar level of hospitality to the many visitors who come to enjoy what we have to offer.

During the course of this year, Allen has led us through the process of updating our mission, vision and values statements. Four key words starting G-G-L-C,

"Growing with God in a Loving Community", capture our mission to provide worship, Christian education, pastoral care, outreach and service opportunities in the church, school and local area layers of our community. That is the statement of mission that we presented at the AGM. At the HYM, we will present our vision

"To be a Christ-focussed centre for our local community, that excels at worship, caring, growing faith through prayer and study of God's word,

and serving our Church and wider community." and what we hold as our eight core values:

being Christ-centred; being founded on God's Word; worship; fellowship; discipleship/education; service; prayer; equality.

We will be presenting these at the HYM for discussion, and if there is general agreement, for approval of the congregation. These will then form the foundation for the next steps in our Strategic Planning process, to set out strategic goals for the years ahead.

We have been following the new Child Safety Standards processes defined by the LCA earlier this year. Allyson Dutschke conducted the self-assessment and made recommendations to Church Council for the Child Safety Plan, which has now been accepted and formalised in the CSS framework. This has been a useful exercise in identifying strengths and weaknesses in our approach to child safety across our programs, and now we have steps in place to address areas where improvements can be made.

Having been at the helm of the Fete Team for the last 4 years, Lesley will be taking a break. We are enormously appreciative of Lesley's leadership and the success it has brought.

Also Kate Hampel as Treasurer is unable to continue next year. We thank Kate for her work this year. Andrew Schmidt has kindly agreed to stand for the Treasurer position at the upcoming HYM.

Dave Shrowder has been taking care of the Pastoral Care Team since 2017. Thanks Dave for your work over this time and thanks to Allen Kupke for stepping in to the role.

Greg has declined three calls. We have also had Picnic and Prayers in the Park, Easter, Youth Car Wash, an AGM, Trivia Night, Pongference and Pong, Fete, Teaching Saturday, and put up some big signs. We are in an exciting place as we enter 2023, which will see the building of our new Foundation classrooms ready to open to students for the first time in 2024, as well as continued planning towards our proposed Early Learning Centre. The school is commented on positively and widely in the community, which was reflected in us receiving the national 'Five Star Innovative Schools Award' to reflect the quality of our teaching practices, curriculum design and innovation in education. Similarly we were delighted to be the first school in South Australia to receive School Aid National Accreditation from the Governor-General for our community service programs—both of these accolades reflect the hard work and dedication of our great team of staff and students.

Thank you to the efforts of our School Board, led my Mrs Tammie Switala, and our Finance Risk and Audit Committee for all of their sterling work this year, along with our Mission and Ministry team. Our many volunteers in these roles have given much time, knowledge and experience to the school this year, from which we will benefit greatly.

The second semester of the year has been an enjoyable and productive one, full of many student highlights. Saachi Singh represented the school beautifully at the IPSHA Junior Orator Competition at Prince Alfred College, and our virtual debating teams enjoyed a range of debates against schools from across Australia. Bishop Paul Smith visited as part of one of our units of inquiry with year 5/6 where we have been learning about innovations, and we were able to have the opportunity to view and learn about his electric car.

Year 4 students enjoyed visiting Endeavour College for an art workshop, and our Year 4 - 6 students also attended the Combined Connected Schools Worship Service at Endeavour College.

A number of our staff attended the biennial Australian Conference for Lutheran Education in Melbourne, and closer to home we also enjoyed our whole staff spiritual retreat which was held at Nunyara this year.

Our P & F welcomed our new Foundation families with an amazing BBQ evening, and also hosted a fantastic quiz night in early November and supported our community fete which proved to be excellent opportunities for our school and church to come together.

A number of our students achieved academic success across the various University of NSW competitions in English, Mathematics, Science and Technology. We also had 17 students graduate from the Children's University programme with the University of Adelaide, which recognises significant engagement with a range of extra-curricular and cultural activities.

The musician Jon Madin visited for a whole school classical music performance day, which culminated in each class delivering a performance, and our students participated in a range of Christian School Sport Association Gala Days including netball, Australian Rules football, basketball and table tennis. Foundation to Year 2 students also enjoyed the tri-skills gymnastics program and year 1 their annual sleepover. Book Week was a huge hit, with the children enjoying the traditional book character costume day, and we were recognised as a school for 98% of our students completing the Premier's Reading Challenge.





Each cluster group did a wonderful job of presenting their learning and knowledge at their respective Celebrations of Learning, whilst the Year 6 PYP Exhibition again proved to be a highlight of the school calendar for the depth and quality of research that the students undertook, presented and performed. Another highlight of the school calendar was our Special Person's Day, where we had many grandparents attend for the concert, classroom visits and a delicious morning tea. We were so privileged to welcome grandparents back into the school for this special day, which was last held in 2019 due to COVID.

Our year 3 - 6 Choir performed at the Festival of Music, which was an amazing evening of singing a broad range of repertoire.

Our links with Golden Grove Lutheran Church continue to grow, with the pong a thon being a great shared success between the school and the church, and the fete also benefited from the sponsorship of some generous school families. We are thankful for all of the work put in by many church volunteers into the fete which was again a successful day this year, despite the influence of the weather! Lauren also set up a prayer spaces activity for our students, who also continue to assist weekly with the Friday morning playgroup.

We held another 10 year reunion this year and look forward to the events that the remainder of the year holds, including year 6 Graduation Dinner and Graduation, as well as our carols evening, P & F Fun Day and Closing Service.

We farewell and thank Mrs Kayla O'Brien at the end of this year, who has done a fantastic job of teaching many students over the past few years, as well as Miss Ashley Jeon, Mrs Melissa Emmett and Mrs Deirdre Fox, all of whom have given our school wonderful service for over a decade. We also thank Mrs Tanya Wilson for her dedicated service to our school as she moves into a full time marketing role with the LLL, Mrs Sharon Trezona for her work in GGOSH, and Mr Jason Kupke for all that he has contributed to our school as chaplain—Jason has now completed his education studies and will be teaching at Good Shepherd next year. We welcome Tanya Rowland to our school as Business Manager, Melissa Laycock as Chaplain and Kelly Underwood as our Communications and Marketing Officer. Mrs Mel Arnold and Mr Luke Napier will also return to their teaching roles with us in 2023, and we are pleased to see them back! "Our links with Golden Grove Lutheran Church continue to grow..."

CHILDREN AND FAMILY MINISTRY

What a year it has been. I can't believe that it was only 12 months ago I took on the role. In some ways I feel as though I have been doing it forever and, yet, in other ways—it feels like I have just begun. When I took over, I had so much to learn and comprehend. Standing up talking in front of children is natural, but to adults as a congregation—well... that was just daunting! However, I feel as though I have overcome this with the help of God and those around me.

Over the past 12 months I have tried to come in with fresh eyes and new insights, whilst still listening and learning along the way. With so many areas to cover, I have begun small with room to build as we progress next year. Some of exciting things that have occurred this year are;

- Engaging with our school community in partnership through an Easter story for Foundation students, prayer spaces day (Year 1 – 6), prayer labyrinths lesson (Year 1/2) and telling the Advent story through Godly Play (Foundation – Year 2).
- Engaging with our Connected Schools Kindergarten (Salisbury Lutheran Kindy) through mainly music sessions.
- Promoting Youth events (Ignite and Senior Youth) through assembly.
- Changing the format of mainly music to unstructured play at the beginning, followed by snack and then finishing with music.
- Introducing more sensory play (rice, flour, jelly) into the unstructured playgroup time

I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know our children and youth through mainly music, Ignite and vine Kids. Each week can be so different, but it is amazing to see the relationships occurring. When I look at the Bible verse from Isaiah 43:2; When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze. I feel as though God has been with me as I begin this journey with the young people in our Church community. None of this could at all be possible without the support of all the amazing volunteers who I work with each week. Their knowledge, wisdom and positive attitude has certainly kept me going week to week.

As 2022 rolls to a close and we look to 2023, keep an eye out for some of the new things that are happening with our young people. "...keep an eye out for some of the new things that are happening with our young people."











The confirmation course is one that is extremely important to the Lutheran church, and within our community. Pastor Greg and Joel Schiller have devoted every second Friday for the past 18 months (and countless more hours) to covering the extent of this course with 8 of our youth from years 7-12 (including myself).

The course typically spans from 2 weeks to 6 months, covering an insight to the basic theological concepts of the Lutheran denomination, with a focus on Luther's Catechism. This covers the 10 Commandments, The Lord's Prayer, and the Apostles Creed. Our church, however, covered the course over 18 months. This significant period of time allowed the confirmands to look deeper into the contents of the Catechism, and also things outside of this, including baptism, communion, and a variety of biblical stories. This duration also allowed students to spend time in reflection, sharing their interpretation, and bonding in fellowship with other congregation members.

At the end of their journey, confirmands developed a faith statement, summing up what they learnt throughout the duration of the course. This was then delivered to the congregation by the confirmand during the confirmation service, when they experienced the rite of confirmation.

The following is a summary of my own faith statement, and confirmation verse:


"In all, I understand that through the generosity of the Father and the Son that he sent, I can and have received Christ as my Lord and therefore am immortal to death. Although I sin, I believe in the teachings of Jesus and his earthly body, and that because of the sacrifice of Jesus, I can repent from my sins and receive eternal life.

I admit that I sin, but I believe that the Holy Spirit convicts me and calls me, as a sinner, into the love and rebirth of Christ, and through this I receive the Holy Spirit dwelling in my heart. Therefore offer my life in service to God."

We began the year on leaders retreat by looking at Matthew 11:28-30 which says "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. The passage I believe has really framed up our year and let me tell you why...

We have been super intentional in how we've structured the nights, to focus more attention on conversations of faith both in small groups and the Get Real panel nights we've had. It's been clear that we're on the right track through Neela's testimony at her baptism recently where she stated that youth has been a key part in her faith journey, as just one example

The youth dynamic changed this year. Last year a large group of year 12s finished up, this year many year 7/8 students have moved in. A lot of these youth are former GGLPS students, which has been awesome to see.

Once again, we will be providing a gift to the graduating year 6 students. The gift has been made by Eleison Co. I believe this is a gift, even though presented by our youth group, which shows the partnership that church and school have. In January we have SPIN (a camp for year 4-6 students) which Noah Hahn is co-directing and many of our leaders will be attending (If your child falls into this age bracket sign them up!), and we will have a leaders' retreat to prepare for the 2023 youth year.

During one of the first weeks in term I next year we are looking at having an Ignite/Youth Opening BBQ and Games. We are looking at the possibility of having it joined with the school too. Be sure to keep an ear out as we will send out details once we have them.

Noah Hahn and Benjamin Ridley will be stepping back from youth. I am very grateful for the many years they have contributed to GGLC Youth, the leadership they have brought will very much be missed.




TACKLE NIGHT - Monday 6th June
