WELCOME TO THE LATEST EDITION OF LIFE IN THE VINE.

Imagine being the first person to pick and try an olive. After biting one and finding it inedibly bitter, you would be forgiven if you cut down and disposed of the tree never to try and taste one again. Instead you persevere and find a way to cure the fruit - a process that is still continuing today (see Olives the Australian Way, pg. 12).

In reflection, like an olive, God did not give up on us sinners. Instead he created a new process, so that we, inheritably broken and condemned, are all saved. And that was Jesus.

As we enter the Easter season we are reminded that "we must never stop looking to Jesus. He is the leader of our faith, and He is the one who makes our faith complete. He suffered death on a cross. But He accepted the shame of the cross as if it were nothing because of the joy He could see waiting for him. And now He is sitting at the right side of God's throne." Hebrews 12:2 ERV

In this edition, from front cover to back, we see the needs, but also rewards, of focusing on Jesus through the many activities and programs of our community. Examples include Healings, School and other group activities as well the continuing search for a Pastor.

To **Focus on Jesus** means to fix our thoughts and actions on Him. We seek his guidance and strength from His teachings and example, and trust in His power and love. Focusing on Jesus and His resurrection remind us that with God, nothing is impossible.

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At the Half Yearly Meeting, it was resolved that Church Council could open discussions with the District on finding a part-time interim pastor "if it deems necessary". Given the "no" on our call to Pastor Ben Hentschke, it has been deemed necessary, and I am pleased to share that the District has agreed to the request. An Expression of Interest (EOI) was sent out to pastors in March with a closing date of April 4, so if you are reading this then nothing could be finalised before LITV went to press! Watch this space.

The role of the interim pastor as expressed in the EOI would encompass:

- Providing support for the lay preaching team
- Filling in gaps in pastoral care
- Supporting the prayer healing ministry
- Providing a presence in the school from time to time
- Delivering 1-2 messages per month

According to the pastor's availability, the role could be negotiated from 0.1FTE up to 0.6FTE, and would remain until a pastor accepts a full time call.

Recognising the ongoing load on our lay preaching team during the vacancy, we have also started providing them with a small amount of financial compensation in the form of an honorarium for messages preached. The District has kindly agreed to fund the honorarium payments from the LCA Transfer and Support Fund (for brevity let's call it the Transfer Fund). The purpose of the Transfer Fund is to provide finances for the transfer of pastors when taking a call and to pay locum pastors during vacancy, and congregations in vacancy pay a proportion of a pastor's wage into the fund.


Last year we paid \$63,255.20 into the fund but only claimed around \$3000. There is clearly an imbalance there, and although it may not be so extreme for all congregations in vacancy, the District has recognised that the fund rules need some fine tuning and is working on it. In the meantime, we have received permission under the current rules of the Transfer Fund to allow payments to lay workers in recognition of the pastoral care role they provide to the congregation.

Two years have passed since the LCA introduced a new child safety framework that is aligned with the National Child Safe Principles. Every two years, a Child Safe Assessor (who we nominate) has a look at our practices in relation to each principle and provides recommendations on a plan to address any weaknesses. Thank you to Allyson who has taken on the Assessor role now for the second time. One of the actions from the previous plan was to increase awareness of the Child Safety Standards for members, and I hope that people have observed and studied the various posters throughout the facility.

On the finance side, we ended up meeting our 2024 budget target (a \$1900 surplus) and whilst some of this is due simply to the timing of payments and receipts, it is still markedly better than the position predicted at the Finance Team meeting in November, so I thank everyone who provided something extra to help out as we headed toward the end of the year. Concurrently with this we were running a fundraising appeal for the acoustic panels in Cafe Connect, raising \$4905 as a significant offset to the cost (ex GST) of \$6420 (including lighting upgrades and finishing flushing of the plaster in the storeroom). Thank you to all who supported this —it has substantially improved the acoustics of the cafe space, although there is still more that can be done.

It is still early days as far as this year's finances are concerned, but there are ongoing signs that offering amounts are trending down.

On March 23, a forum was held for Lutheran community leaders in the northern zone, to discuss the challenges happening in our area—e.g. fewer ordained ministers, many vacancies, membership numbers and finances under pressure. The obvious answer is for there to be increased sharing of resources between communities, but what resources and how this can be practically done are still questions to be resolved. The primary outcome of the forum was to set up a working group to further examine the issues and develop some proposals.









School Update: A Strong Start to 2025

It has been truly invigorating to welcome back our staff and students for the 2025 school year. The energy around our café, church, and school campus is palpable as everyone settles into the new academic term.

Focus on Jesus

As we navigate this school year together, we are reminded of our foundational commitment to keep Jesus at the centre of all we do. The theme for this issue of Life in the Vine is a most fitting one - Hebrews 12:2: "Let us keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, on whom our faith depends from beginning to end. He did not give up because of the cross! On the contrary, because of the joy that was waiting for him, he thought nothing of the disgrace of dying on the cross, and he is now seated at the right side of God's throne."

This verse inspires our community to maintain our focus on Christ through both challenges and celebrations, remembering that our faith journey begins and ends with Him.

IB Evaluation Preparation

Our staff team has been diligently preparing for the upcoming external International Baccalaureate evaluation of our school scheduled for August. As an IB school, we undergo a comprehensive external evaluation every five years to ensure we maintain the highest standards of international education.

The International Baccalaureate Organisation has provided us with key dates for our evaluation process:

- Preliminary review documentation submission: February 15, 2025
- Self-study questionnaire deadline: May 1, 2025
- Tentative evaluation visit: August 6-8, 2025

Please note that these dates may be adjusted as the IB has requested a hybrid visit with at least one evaluator on-site, rather than a fully remote evaluation. The Board held an additional meeting on Tuesday, March 11 specifically to review our Primary Years Programme in preparation for this important evaluation.

Staffing Updates

It is a pleasure to share several staffing updates:

- Mel Bishop continues to recover from her leg injury and we greatly appreciate your continued prayers for her healing. It's wonderful to have Mel back with us this year.
- Tanya Van Zwol has joined our team parttime as a teacher's aide (LSO), primarily supporting our Foundation students.
- Sharlene Rothe came on board late last year to provide two days per week support to our Business Manager, Tanya Rowland, as a Finance Officer.
- We extend warm congratulations to Emma Wachtel (and her husband Luke!) as she prepares to take parenting leave from the end of this term for the remainder of the year. We wish them all the best for this exciting new chapter.
- Miss Brianna Stanley has been appointed to teach Foundation with Mrs. Hughes from Term 2 onwards. Brianna joins us from Tyndale Christian School, where she gained valuable experience across various classes, including small group classes for students with additional learning needs, as well as Foundation.

Enrolment Growth

We are pleased to report current enrolment of 210 students, which is aligned to our budget projection for the year. We are also looking forward to welcoming around 10 mid year Reception students in July.

Marketing Initiatives

Our marketing efforts continue in full force, with particular thanks to Robert Mills for his ongoing dedication in this area. Current focus areas include links with local preschools and day care centres, letterbox drops and enhanced online advertising.

The search for a pastor continues...

The Call Team's search for a pastor to join Golden Grove continues. I know this is taking longer than we had hoped but we, the Call Team, are still very positive and committed to finding the right fit for us and not simply inviting whoever is available.

A lot of thought is going into the very long list of available pastors, about 107 names, and how we are narrowing that list down to people we would like to meet with. Allen Kupke has been essential in that regard by highlighting pastors who already have the experience we desire and have worked in a similar setting to what we have here at Golden Grove. Early on in this process Jon Schutz created a spreadsheet where we have been able to directly compare skills and attributes for each pastor. The team has found this a helpful tool.

Many of the pastors we have contacted have said that they believe they are still called to where they are and are not willing to consider a move. We only need one...We are hopefully speaking to a candidate this week and rest assured that we will continue to do all we can until we have secured the best pastor for our church.

In the previous episode, we heard how a landscape that looked like a scene from an old Western movie (desolate scorched earth, tumbleweed blowing across the plain, airs of orchestral music filtering in over the noise of the wind, no signs of humanity for miles—that sort of scene) was transformed into a scene from The Block (where they show people building houses—that sort of scene) and in the blink of an eye (that could be mistaken for a coma if one were to blink for that long) we reached the point of having a complete house frame.

A few more semi-comatose blinks later, we had roof, gutters, windows, plumbing, gas and Christmas.

In the building industry there are few things more effective for causing an extended work site shutdown than Christmas.

Time marched by and then it was March. A team of brickies marched in and bricks were completed in less than two weeks. This was good news, as an earlier estimate based on prior progress had the bricklaying task taking 30 years. Then came air conditioning, electrical wiring, insulation and plasterboard on the ceilings and walls, all within a few days. With just a few more essentials (e.g. coffee machine, Netflix subscription), one could almost live in it

From here we should reach completion in 4 months. If we call a pastor now, he should arrive in 4 months.





























As we head towards Easter we take the opportunity to reflect on what Jesus did for you and me. We celebrate Jesus setting us free. He reminds us to continue to keep our eyes fixed on him, no matter what is happening in our Life and no matter what is happening in the world. Jesus is Alive, he is a Now God, he paid the ultimate price for us. Jesus is a gentleman, he won't force anything upon us, he gives us all free will. He is willing if we are!!

The prayer ministry is very much part of this of where God wants us to intervene, to be his conduits to be his hands and feet, to set us free from whatever is hindering us. Jesus did not leave us helpless. He sent the Holy Spirit, the God of the universe, to live inside of us. WOW!!

Acts 1:8 - You shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come... and to witness...to the ends of the earth.

In the Healing Team we have many opportunities to pray, for people's family members and/or their friends, and not all of them know Jesus. Just like the Roman Centurion (Matthew 8), if they are on your heart when we pray it's like they are there (in the spirit).

At times it can be difficult praying for your own family members, especially when you see them suffering, it's emotional. A young lady had a brain aneurysm. She had over a 6-hour operation and was in a coma. About 3 weeks later after the operation we received a call from the family. They said the doctors are concerned that she may never wake up from the coma so we went to the hospital. The parents were emotionally drained and were having trouble fixing their eyes on Jesus to get a clear focus on what to pray for (very understandable). We stood in the gap and whilst we were praying for the young lady, she woke from her coma.

Prayer is not a chore, it's an opportunity to interact with the God of this universe. It's just trusting God and that when we pray things change! Having the confidence and trust that it's not us but the Holy Spirit at work.

At the last Healing Service we had the opportunity to pray for a lovely couple that both were in desperate need of healing. The lady was using a walking stick and he had a walking aide. She was in a lot of pain (10 out of 10 pain level). They eagerly joined in at the prayer station where we got to know them, to feel relaxed and ready to receive what Jesus had already paid for. They had only been to this church once for voting and they had walked through the Community Fete. It took courage to walk into a strange environment. Both of them walked out very happy. They looked refreshed and their walking had improved lots and her pain had gone.

The Healing Service is only small part of what we do to support people in need. We had a young lady with 2 young children, who was diagnosed with stage 4 cancer. We went to her house to pray for the family as the whole family is affected. We continued praying with her over the phone on a regular basis. These regular discussions were to keep her 'eyes' focussed on Jesus rather than fear and doubt, and to provide support she needed in those dark times. We continued to keep these conversations going until she received the all clear!! Thank you Jesus!!

The Healing Service is held the first Sunday of each month. It is a lighthouse for people in need, knowing that help is here. For those who can't always make it to the church service, we can provide help by phone, email and personal visits to homes or hospitals.

This ministry has been going for 15 plus years and the Healing Services for over 7 years and we have seen many many people set free. We would love for you to join us at the prayer station. You have the option to just listen, or release an encouraging word, to tune in to what God is guiding us to say, and/or pray for the person when you're ready to do so.

God has blessed us by providing the tools!!

GGLC members John and Sue Fielke have been creating award winning table olives since 2021. Once again their olives are for sale at the GGLC's Café Connect with all proceeds of those sales going toward the GGLC budget. Comments on the olives include:

- I don't normally like olives but I really like these
- they are refreshing; they taste fruity

The olives are available as whole, pitted or sliced olives.

In the Bible, olive trees are mentioned 25 times and olive oil 160 times (Source Google). John (Fielke, not the Gospel) says "God has truly blessed us along the journey of processing an ancient biblical food through the people and resources provided to us."

John has a patent and trademark on his "Olives the Australian Way" process. Through his employer (University of South Australia) and Department of Education's Australian Economic Accelerator funding John is leasing the Viva Olives factory at Loxton to help expand production of Australian grown and processed table olives.





John and Sue are spending most of their week days at Loxton and sell their fruit in bulk 220 litre barrels to resellers of olive products in Adelaide and Melbourne. In 2024 they processed 17,000 kg of olives and at the end of March 2025 are just starting receival of what is expected to be over 60,000 kg of olives. Australia currently has 20,000 ha of olive trees which are mainly for olive oil. John and Sue's 5 year plan is to take the Loxton factory to 500 tonnes of olives per year and seek corporate investors to license the process and plant 10,000 ha of olive trees for table olives. These trees will provide enough fruit to process 100,000 tonnes of table olives for local and export markets.









We have had one Messy Church event this year following on from our success last year. We kicked off with 'Jonah's Messy Olympics'.

Families engaged in a variety of activities that allowed them to show their throwing, fishing and running skills. As always, the children enjoyed playing with each other and spending time participating in the activities with the leaders.

We looked at the story of Jonah and how, even though he kept running away, God never gave up on him. He also picked Jonah to go because he had the talent of words and speaking.

God never gives up on us so how can you use your talent to follow Jesus and share His love with others?




















This group began many years ago as a need in the congregation. We were looking at ways that we could focus on Jesus and build relationships and connections with others in the church and school community.

The group began meeting in a room in the school and eventually our home base became Pastor's office.

We meet every two weeks on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month from 10am – 11:30am. The format is cuppa and a chat, a Bible study and we finish with prayer.

How do we focus on Jesus and keep our eyes fixed on Him?

We delve into Gods word - the Bible, to find out who He is, what are His characteristics, the truth that He speaks, what is God saying from the biblical events, and what is He saying to us today. We learn so much about God's great love for us and His gift of GRACE to us through the death and resurrection of His only Son – Jesus. Why wouldn't we want to keep our lives focussed on Jesus?

We dig deep and share what we discover finding lots of little gems. God speaks to each of us in different ways so our understanding and relationship with God grows. We have looked at the Psalms, parables, Jesus' healing, miracles of Jesus, resurrection events, death of Jesus, themes from synod, a funeral or church message, a single verse or a large part of scripture. We also have been using a video Faith series once a month by Ray Vanderlaan who shares biblical historical scenes and then relates them to this day.


