Wishing you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year filled with many wonderful memories to reminisce on!



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
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




HIGHLIGHTS FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

2025 CHAT GPT Jon with another fun fact

"It has been a season of experiences for which I am grateful."

As I leave the post of Chairperson, I feel it is time for a confession. I hope the statute of limitations has passed on this one. In my very first Life in the Vine article as Chair—which you will all remember from March 2016 ¹ as Rosalie interviewing the new Chairperson—in fact I wrote both the questions and answers myself while sitting in a cafe at Fisherman's Wharf, San Francisco, during a work trip, with no Rosalie in sight anywhere. Now that the truth has set me free and in the spirit of two wrongs making a right, Rosalie (me) will interview me (me) again to reflect on the past 10 years.

R: Welcome back.

J: Thank you Rosalie.

R: So, you made it through 10 years, beyond all expectations. Why are you getting out now?

J: Could I go on for longer? Probably. Should I? I don't think so. A wise elder of the congregation once told me that it was a 5 year job, then I should get out of the way and let someone else have a go. For me, these last ten years have been a season of service—full of planning, discussion, challenge (COVID and others), building, and following God's plan. It has been a season of experiences for which I am grateful. Ecclesiastes 3 tells us "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." Leadership in the church is never meant to be permanent. It's meant to be faithful—for a time. And then it is meant to be passed on so that others can bring fresh eyes, new energy, and different gifts. We see this with pastors—they serve for a period and then are called elsewhere. This is both organisational and Biblical wisdom, with many examples: Moses led Israel to the edge of the Promised Land, but God appointed Joshua to take them in; David prepared the way for the temple, but Solomon built it; Elijah passed his mantle to Elisha; Paul trained many leaders in the New Testament church, then moved on.

Ecclesiastes reminds us that when a season concludes, that too is a gift. Change is a sign of life. Healthy things grow. Growing things change. So I think this is the right time for change in our congregation, and it's also the right time for me to have a break.

R: We didn't have a pastor when you were elected to the Chair position and we don't have one now as you step down. What does that say about your term in office?

J: Great question, although I think it would be fair to note that Pastor Greg started within a few weeks of me taking on the role, and served our congregation in an outstanding way for 8 years. We are of course working on calling our next pastor; unfortunately our most recent call to Pastor Lee Kroehn was declined, but he conveyed to us that the main barrier was the timing, and left the door wide open for us to issue another call to him later on.

R: So what do we do while we don't have a pastor?

J: Well, Pastor Greg provided us with a great service before he left, in grounding our six young adults for the lay preaching role. They have been supporting us for almost two years now—certainly longer than we had hoped, and from the beginning of this year we have been expressing our gratitude for their service through honorarium payments when they preach. Previously I reported that the District had agreed to fund the honorarium payments from the LCA Transfer and Support Fund. Regrettably, that decision was reversed at the Churchwide Office level. I have little insight into the details but you can be assured that our disappointment was unambiguously expressed. Ultimately, Church Council had no reservations in agreeing to pay the honoraria from congregational funds, although we continue to hold the view that the LCA Transfer Fund should have been able to provide this support.

R: Hmm, yes that's certainly less than satisfactory regarding the Transfer Fund.

J: Indeed. But let's not forget that although we don't have a pastor, we do. Pastor Kevin has been settling into the role of part-time interim pastor at 0.25FTE, supporting us one Sunday morning each month, at the Prayer Healing Service each month, and otherwise at the school, in Bible study groups and elsewhere as needed. He will also be running a confirmation course in the new year. We are blessed to have the presence of a pastor with such life experience and preaching experience, giving contrast to the youthful life perspectives of our younger lay preachers, and perhaps it is the contrast that gives us a better appreciation of both styles.

R: Did you achieve what you set out to achieve?

J: I think I can say that I did, because I didn't come in with particularly big aspirations. As attested to in my entrance interview, I was hoping to tidy up some governance aspects and sort out the toilets. Well ok, there was a bit more of a vision than that, in that we had a direction to make GGLC a place that people want to be, and to let the community know what we have here. I think we have done that—and of course it's not just about me, it's been a team effort to work together on these things over the 10 years. The governance is not perfect, and probably never will be, as we are a small organisation—but it's in a pretty good position, and partly thanks to modern technology, our administration and financial management is also feeling reasonably robust. The toilets escalated into a full-blown office, cafe, youth room, deck, carpet and chairs renovation, and the way was opened for us to do all of that on a modest budget; those facilities improvements have a long term impact on many of the things we do. Curiously, this was also the origin of the annual fete, the first fete being a celebration of the opening of Cafe Connect. To be frank, I wasn't particularly keen on the idea initially, but agreed that we needed to celebrate the cafe so went along with it—and that has now snowballed into an annual community event with 3700 visitors this year. I'm pretty sure that getting a new altar wasn't near the top of my list either, but it tied in well with our 30th anniversary celebrations. Likewise with the replacement of the manse—I think the first time it was raised my reaction was "That's never going to happen".

So I feel that yes, as a team we have achieved many things, which may not have been on the initial agenda but were on the agenda of Proverbs 16:9—"Man's mind plans his way, but God directs his steps". I would have liked to have delivered a manse and a pastor by the end of my term, but turns out that pastors are harder than manses.

R: Are we in good shape?

J: Yes and no. I hear from external people that our youth programs, our fete, our cafe, our relationship with the school and even the vibe of fellowship after services are the envy of other congregations. Our main challenge is financial. The manse project was partly to provide a more suitable home for our pastor's family and partly to improve our loan situation, which it has certainly helped with, but the cost of wages and insurance have continued to increase whilst our offering income has fallen sharply. Fete and cafe incomes have steadily increased but not sufficiently to offset the downturn in offerings. This year we will have a surplus—as we should, since we have only been paying 50% of a pastor's wage (into the Transfer Fund)—but the surplus is not as large as it should have been under the circumstances. Next year we have budgeted on the basis of a 6 month vacancy, which ends up working out to about 75% of a pastor's wage, but we are still predicting a deficit when we should again be in surplus. We need to recover from this so that we can continue to invest in our child and youth programs, and maybe more importantly in the short term, demonstrate that our finances are healthy enough to continue to support a full time pastor several years into the future.

R: What do you think has caused the downturn in offerings?

J: Well, we've seen that the *number* of REG contributors appears to have increased, so members are giving support through regular giving, but even so, the *total REG offering* is down. Having considered the possible causes over the course of a few years now, I think the main issue is that we are a victim of our Bactrian demographics.

R: Bactrian? J: A two-humped camel.

R: Not helping. J: One hump is the age group from the mid 40s to mid 90s, peaking near retirement age; we have had a number of members make the transition from full time employment into retirement recently, which is going to affect giving. The other hump has a peak around 25—our younger people who may still be studying or just starting out in their careers—and with living costs and housing costs as they are, they are unlikely to be able to make a large commitment to offering. The region of our demographics chart around age 40 is an abyss; we have very few who are often the backbone of church giving, reaching that age of higher earnings and the point where they start to get ahead on the home loan and so on.

R: Is there any way out? J: The size of the problem is about \$30,000. Incremental increases in income from the cafe and fete won't cover that. But—and this is not to tell people how much to give, just to demonstrate that the problem is manageable—in a congregation of around 150 members, if we say 100 are regular givers—then it works out to \$300 per giver per year, or less than a dollar per day. So if everyone can give a bit extra according to their means, we can make this sustainable.

R: You mentioned our children's program. What's happening there?

J: After Lauren stepped down in the middle of this year to pursue her studies, we have tried (unsuccessfully) to recruit a replacement, and in the meantime volunteers have been covering the Messy Music playgroup, Messy Church and Sunday Vine Kids programs as best they can. Even with the challenge of budget, Church Council expressed an intent to keep these programs going through volunteers and/or a paid position. We'll continue to work on it, and if anyone can help or knows someone who might be interested, either in volunteering or employment, please let us know.

R: Is everyone else on Church Council continuing?

J: Ruth is stepping down from the Christian Education Chairperson role, and we welcome Bec Wallace into that position. We thank Ruth, who came very highly qualified for the position, for her oversight of our children's ministry and adult education activities since 2017. Denise, who has been on Council since 2014 (but not as long as Jacquie, currently the longest serving, since 2011), has flagged that 2026 will be her last year but would welcome any offers to have someone take over her role as Secretary at any time.

R: What was your favourite part of the role?

J: I don't have favourites. But I do look back with nostalgia on the COVID times when I could spend a day each week making videos of questionable quality for the announcements. Did you know I won an Oscar for that?

R: Who is taking over as Chair?

"...I'd like to thank all of those people for their support and their contributions."



J: Well, that is for the congregation to determine at the Half Yearly Meeting, so without pre-empting how the congregation will vote, Luke Wachtel is the single candidate standing for nomination and I fully endorse his candidacy. Luke is stepping up to take on the challenge of this role at a time in his life when he has a young family and a busy job; after testing the role for 6 months or 12 months or however long it works out to be, we need to mindful of and respect that he may have to make the choice not to continue. We also need to respect that he will do things his own way which will be different to what we have become used to for the last 10 years. But with prayerful support, and direct support through volunteering to help with tasks that might have otherwise been left with the Chair, let us hope that Luke can fill the role for long enough to leave his mark. It is clear that, being half my age for a start, his approach will be different to mine, and I hope we can all get behind him. I'm very grateful to Luke for stepping in at this time.

R: Are you going anywhere?

J: No, I'm still here, and continuing in roles on the Communications Team, Finance Team, Fete Team and Call team, and will continue to manage the manse through to completion. I'm stepping off Church Council to give Luke some space, but am able to provide support if needed.

R: Do you want to thank anybody else before you sign off?

J: Well of course, but it would be a long list. I'll just mention Greg, as we started our roles at the same time and had to find our feet together. I think it's fair to say that we had complementary skills, and that worked well. We have also had a fairly consistent core at Church Council, and I'd guess over the 10 years around 20 or so people have been involved. So I'd like to thank all of those people for their support and their contributions. I'd also like to thank the person who laughed at my joke during the announcements, and all the others in the congregation who have offered me encouragement over the years.

R: Thank you for sharing with Life in the Vine.

J: Rosalie, the pleasure has been all mine.

"One day we didn't have a house, and the next...we did"




Soon after the previous episode was published in April, we reached the lockup stage, after which there was very little visible progress. Then suddenly, we had a house.

After many hurdles, setbacks and date changes, they arrived at Adelaide Airport late on Tuesday night, for them into a big unknown! Only Joppie had been here before and the others had never been out of PNG, so it was very daunting but also new and exciting for them.

At this end, we had been working hard preparing for them, to ensure that the teachers returned home with many 'Collected Memories'. We had to remain flexible with the dates and plan appropriate events to give them balanced visits to our schools and experience some of where and how we live, while always being sensitive to their way of life.

As always, our wonderful congregation pulled hard together and we had all we needed: Billets, Drivers, Food Providers, Tag-A-Longs on excursions and money provided for entries, food and other things. We had a wonderful Sunday worship together with a lunch after where many conversations were shared.

School visits were also a focus and the teachers were blessed with tours of:

- We took them to visit Len and Claire Tscharke's grave, as that was important for them.
- Yitpi Yartapuultiku (new Kaurna cultural centre at Port Adelaide). Willis, the head ranger gave a guided tour around the centre and gardens being established. They learned much, including that his grandfather was from PNG, and were able to fill in some knowledge gaps in his heritage!

Everything was a highlight as it was all very new to them, but they did love seeing the schools, learning about our farms and how we have wild animals just freely roaming the countryside! They noted how we do drive everywhere (instead of walking) and the big city was too busy for them! But they all collected many memories that they will keep and share with all their families, friends and students back home in PNG. They were very grateful for all we did for them and our hospitality. In 2025 we raised over \$20,300 in the fight for freedom, which takes our total over the seven years we've run the event to \$87,000!

Next year we will be aiming to reach \$100,000!

Everyone deserves to live a life free from bondage and enslavement, as Luke 4:18 says Jesus came to set the captive free. Through Pong we can assist others who live in a very different reality by shining the light of Jesus into some very dark places in the world.

Slavery takes many forms including human trafficking, sex trafficking and bonded labour. The funds raised help Pong partners who work on the ground to help with prevention, rescue, education and employment. It's something that doesn't just happen overseas, but it happens here in Australia too. One of the Pong partners is based here in Australia, looking to deal with slavery right in our backyard.

Christian Koelbach from International Justice Mission shared the following story. There are people desperate to get a job that see a job advertised overseas. They are promised the world but then they are taken and put into a call centre called KK Park in Myanmar. These people are trapped and forced to work extended hours and scam people, not by choice. This story ended with one person being freed from this bondage. The story gets us to think about the lives of people on the other end of scam calls, some may be caught in slavery.

A massive thank you to our sponsors who made the day happen, and all the volunteers who gave up their time to help things run smoothly.


















































ARISE YOUTH
