Pastor Greg Shares God in our midst

'The world has gone crazy!' is something I hear everyday. The Coronavirus pandemic has affected all of us in some way and we are witnessing things most of us have not experienced in our lifetimes. Empty shelves in the supermarket reminds me of Eastern Block countries in the Cold War. And social distancing is something my mother talked about when there were infectious outbreaks when she was a child. We all believed that our market economy and advanced health systems would protect us from these type of events. In the moments of worry and unease we can wonder, is God here and is he in control?

God's people have often wondered "Where is God?". In his note to pastors this week, Bishop David reminded us that the Israelites thought God had forgotten them when they were in the desert and had no water. Moses demonstrated God's power by striking a rock, after which fresh water flowed to the whole community (Exodus 17). We see that despite outward appearances, God was very much in control and would not allow his people to perish no matter what they endured. He was in their midst. While we take the precautions that our government recommends, we do not become downhearted or panicked because we know that a greater power is at work for our good. He is in our midst.

How we react to this situation will define us. Because we believe that God is in control and he will bring blessing from whatever crisis appears, we will bring good news of his work to all people. Because we are so loved and we have an eternal hope as an antidote to things that could cripple us, we will gladly fulfil Jesus' command to love one another as he loves us (John 13:34-35). This means that we will not seek to simply survive ourselves but we will gladly offer what we have to those in need. We will be agents of selflessness at a time where selfishness is everywhere. We will bear witness to our God who will sustain us and continue to be our great provider.

Highlights from Church Council

- Up to and including our most recent Council meeting in early March, COVID-19 had not featured in Council discussions, apart from poorly chosen similes along the lines of "we'd like to see our membership numbers hockey-stick like the coronavirus". Jokes are cheap while we remain unaffected. As much as we hope and pray we can continue that way, there is the potential for things to change very quickly, and indeed, although to date we have no reports of infections in our community, unprecedented government directives are impacting each one of us individually and how we operate as a congregation.
- In fact, this is the third time I have rewritten this article before LITV goes to press. We have shifted from mild directives on social distancing and gathering sizes to a shutdown of worship in the space of two weeks, completely changing how we think about worshiping and providing Christian fellowship within our congregation.
- From Sunday March 29, GGLC services will be online only, until such time as Government restrictions are removed.
- Cafe Connect remains open from 8am to 11am each school day for take-away only. We hope to make available options for ordering online and carpark pick-up shortly.
- All groups within the church are encouraged to continue to meet using whatever means possible that will ensure the health and safety of all participants and comply with Government directives. For example, our youth and young adults groups will be meeting virtually using the Zoom conferencing system.
- If anyone in our community needs assistance with technology - be it accessing the online worship services, or logging into an online meeting, or getting set up to connect with family and friends please contact the GGLC office.
- Please continue to pray for each other in these challenging times.
- In 2019 we oversaw the final stages of the renovations, the commencement of Café Connect, the fete and official opening of Café Connect, a significant budget appeal and fundraising effort, two staff changes and one first grandson, and signed off on two government grants. With such a heavy business agenda, we spent most of our time on administration, leaving little time (or headspace) for governance.

- From the beginning of 2020, we have returned to the governance agenda, and started working through a strategic planning process, with the goal to update our mission, vision and values statements and set strategic objectives for the near future. This is a step-by-step process and is likely to take most of this year (COVID-19 permitting).
- Pastor Greg received and declined a call to Alice Springs in the early part of this year. I think I reflect the general feeling, not just within Council, that Greg's four years of ministry to date have established a foundation, and many further blessings await Greg and Connie and the congregation through the coming years as we build on that together. Therefore everyone was very relieved when Greg reported that he had declined the call...
- ...and then Greg received a call to Darwin. Please remember Greg and Connie in your prayers as they consider this latest call.
- Pastor Greg's regular 3-4 year review was scheduled to happen on March 21 but has been deferred due to COVID-19. The review is being led by Pastor Steen Olsen and supported by several members of the congregation and the school principal.
- The Teaching Weekend in mid-February on establishing relationships was very well received, and plans are in place to follow this up practically (such as by working with our greeters to ensure they are aware, for example, of what might be important to a new visitor to our church) and educationally (with follow-on sessions).
- To assist with our pastoral care program, we will be asking for everyone to update their details with the church office or via our website. Details will follow.
- On finances, it is too early in the year to see how we are tracking, but we know we have a challenging year ahead with gaps to be filled by fundraising. It may become more challenging as the economic impact of COVID-19 flows through. At the Half-Yearly Meeting, a suggestion was made that we could add a 'sponsor-a-chair' type fundraiser to help with the new chair repayments – this is currently being considered and information will flow through later in the year if it makes sense to proceed.
- We have set the date for this year's fete as October 18 and will continue to work toward that in the hope that the world environment improves by then.
- Our website at <u>https://www.gglc.org.au/</u> has undergone some upgrades – in particular, it is much easier to use on a mobile device. Please take a moment to have a look.

Pastoral Care Team

2019 was a really productive and effective year for the Pastoral Care Team. God provided the wisdom we needed to develop several areas. This is just a very brief summary of those areas which are being implemented throughout 2020:

Visiting Team:

Over the years GGLC has been blessed with some very dedicated members who have enjoyed visiting other members who are ill or might be struggling in some way. Unfortunately, many of those people are no longer able to make the visits. However, we have now been blessed again with a new team of members who are keen to support Pastor Greg with visiting members of Golden Grove. This Visiting Team will be officially installed at a service in the near future.

Welcoming Church:

We believe Golden Grove Lutheran Church is a welcoming church, but we also believe as a congregation we can do even better. Over recent years the Ushers' role has increased considerably, so the ushers have been expected to set up morning tea at the same time as they are expected to greet people at the door. To ease this burden, the role has been split in two:

- *Welcomers* who will greet people at the door as they arrive and help them to feel at home. When visitors or new members arrive, the Welcomers will make sure they know where the toilets are, what children's activities will occur during the service, how communion is distributed, where morning tea will be held after the service, how the café operates, etc. After the service they'll follow up and, if appropriate, introduce them to others in the congregation, or arrange a visit from Pastor etc
- *Morning Tea people* who will be responsible for setting up the morning tea prior to the service, ensuring altar candles are lit, collecting the offering and distributing the individual communion cups etc

Training is being provided at the end of March, so we expect the new roles to be operating in April.

Growing Young:

The Pastoral Care Team has worked closely with the Christian Education Team to develop GGLC as a "Growing Young" Church where members are encouraged to interact with each other across the generations. Older members in particular will be encouraged to develop relationships with our youth members, so the youth are able to feel a very real part of our congregation now – not seen only as "the future of our congregation". Both teams will be working closely with Joel to arrange opportunities for members to develop the Growing Young concept.

Fellowship Event Coordinator:

Grant Hampel has been appointed to this role and is preparing to hold several events during 2020. He will be working closely with the school, with youth leaders, and with the Fete Committee to ensure as much cooperation as possible and to avoid duplication of efforts.

As mentioned above, the Pastoral Care Team is excited about developments in 2020, and we pray that God will continue to bless us with the wisdom to make decisions in line with his will.

Establishing and Strengthening Relationships Ruth Zimmermann

The Teaching Weekend was held on Friday February 14 and Saturday February 15. Emma Graetz from Australian Lutheran College presented the workshop. The focus of the weekend was on *Establishing and Strengthening Relationships*. The Friday evening session provided some insights about communication in relationships. One of the first questions Emma asked was "What skills are involved in having a 'healthy' relationship?" There were numerous responses, but it was established that **trust is the foundation stone!** Emma reminded us of Psalm 118:8, *It is better to take refuge in the Lord than to trust in humans.*

Emma also pointed out that our calling is to be *relational*. In other words, we are a walking cross, in relationship with God (vertical) and in relationship with others (horizontal). In-

sights were provided on how to relate to others, including the importance of *ac-tive listening*. This was summed up beautifully in the quote, "**The next best thing to being loved is being listened to**". Emma also outlined the differences between introverts and extroverts — introverts like to recharge their energies by themselves whilst extroverts seek the company of others — and this can determine how people respond in different fellowship situations. Mention was also made of the 5 Love Languages (Words of Affirmation, Quality Time, Receiving Gifts, Acts of Service, and Physical Touch). Different people express love in different ways and we can learn other people's love language in order to communicate with them more effectively.

The sessions on Saturday concentrated on fellowship in community (Koinonia). Participants spent time examining what GGLC already does to create koinonia and then identified some additional ways to meet the needs of new and existing members. The final part of the day concentrated on learning about relationship strategies and practical ideas that could be employed by all members of the congregation.

Not Ashamed John Fielke

On Saturday 29th February, Sue and John Fielke attended the 2020 South Australian annual conference of the Australian Christian Lobby (ACL) at the Adelaide Convention Centre. Its theme was "Not Ashamed". It was attended by 300 Christians of many denominations. It was the largest ACL South Australian conference ever. The day was filled with information, worship, praise and prayer.

I hadn't really known much about the ACL and its activities. It is a grass roots organisation to lobby politicians and influence both state and national politics based on Christian beliefs. Four hot topics at the moment that I learnt they are pro-active on are:

- The federal Religious Freedom Bill;
- The local (SA) Abortion bills;
- The local (SA) Prostitution bill;
- Gender identification and reassignment.



We had several SA based politicians attend the day. I was very impressed with Steve Murray MP for Davenport (Southern Adelaide) and his work on the abortion and prostitution bills. Did you know that the proposal in SA is to allow legal abortion up to birth?

With regard to the prostitution bill, we saw the influence of the ACL by the Sex Industry Network (SIN) members protesting with placards at the entry of the conference. The ACL is supporting MPs to work toward adopting the "Nordic model" where the purchaser of sex is prosecuted rather than the worker. The model also provides help for sex workers to leave the industry.

The Religious Freedom Bill is being supported by the ACL to allow the continuity of religious schools to be faith-based. This has been under debate/attack with many MPs trying to reduce the influence of the Church.

Did you know that a parent has no legal right to stop their child from seeking treatment and assistance to take puberty blocking chemicals and then undertake gender reassignment surgery? Whilst there are many services to help a child go through gender reassignment, the debate is over if anyone should be allowed to counsel a child about possibly not undertaking the process.

Following the conference, on 16 March Sue and I letterboxed 600 homes in an Adelaide electorate with the message "Every abortion ends a human life". This was an ACL national one-day project that letter boxed 250,000 homes nationally by 700 volunteers.

The main message of the ACL conference was: if societal issues are of importance to you, firstly regularly write/email your local MP, and secondly join a political party (of your own preference) and be involved in the candidate selection process as it is the local party members who choose the candidates that get put to the electorate.

Teen Missions Holly Schutz

Over the school summer holidays, 4 different teams of Australian and Kiwi teens went to Uganda, Nepal, Vanuatu and Scotland to work on a project to help out missionaries there and to preach the gospel. This was through an organisation called *Teen Missions Int'l Australia & New Zealand* (TMI). TMI's motto is "Training tomorrow's missionary today". They are all about getting teens involved in missionary work and growing and developing their faiths. This summer the program went for 6 weeks, involving 10 days of training (boot camp) with the teams in Brisbane, 3.5 weeks in the field and a few days of debrief preparing us to go home again.

This summer, Lauren Kahl and I went on the Scotland team. In Scotland, we stayed and worked in the Windmill Christian Centre in Arbroath, which is a youth centre where many church event and youth



camps are held. There we were hosted by our missionary Amy, who runs the centre, and we were set to work painting the top and middle floor dorms. This involved the preparation work (laying down tarps, taping etc.), sealing any holes in the wall then sanding them down along with the skirting boards and then painting it all. God worked through us throughout the 3 weeks we were there and we managed to surpass Amy's expectations of the amount of work we got done. By the end of our time in Scotland, we had painted 17 dorm rooms, some halls and passageways, and assisted some of the staff at the windmill in painting the worship hall (we painted the ceiling blue!). I understand a mission trip to Scotland sounds strange, but in Scotland the number of Christian youth who are active in their faith is less than 2%, and they have many problems with drugs and alcohol. Much of the evangelism we did involved going to youth groups, presenting in churches and presenting to younger children.

During the trip, God worked through our team repeatedly through prayer. For the first 2 weeks, we had no evangelism opportunities and had been working inside for the majority of our time. We prayed for opportunities to arise, and lo and behold, we had around 5 opportunities in the span of about one weekend. As always, God's timing was perfect as we had just enough time to finish most of our painting work in the first 2 weeks, which allowed us to fully focus and prepare for the opportunities that we had. God also healed our team leader's feet after a lot of prayer, and we had the chance to go to a prayer meeting on new year's morning with one of the churches that we went to. God worked through our team and the other 4 TMI teams a lot over this summer, and he developed our faiths considerably. It was amazing to experience a small taste of what missionary work was like and to devote an entire summer to God and his work.


Salt Factory
